

## HORSE RACES TO-DAY AT THORNCLIFFE PARK

Card Includes Flat Races and  
Steeplechases—At Duf-  
ferin and Montreal.

An exceptionally good afternoon's sport is promised at Thorncliffe Park for this afternoon. All the riders will be amateur and consequently there will be nothing professional about the gathering. There are four or five entries for every race, of which there are seven. As a sample, in the first event, the contestants will be horses owned by Dr. Temple, Joseph Kilgour, Melville Davies, J. C. Hall and L. Goodenham. In the second M. T. Rawlinson, R. R. Shilbe, Jos. Kilgour and G. W. Beardsmore will compete. So it is all along the line. It is a purely sportsmanlike gathering, which is bound to produce a real good sportsman-like afternoon. A membership fee of \$5 will be charged. But everybody will be welcome. One of the seven races will be one open to farmers and farmers' sons, for which post entries will be received. Arrangements have been made for a special train by the Canadian National, to leave the Union Station for the track at 2 o'clock and to return immediately after the races, making connection north and south with the C.N.O. trains. It promises to be one of those genuine amateur sportsmanlike gatherings that are read about but seldom realized. But all the public are invited.

## Judging Horses At the Exhibition

Previous to the big review of prize-winning horses and cattle before the main stand, a class was shown, made up of the ten best horses, the property of any one individual.

In the light-weight class of this event five exhibitors presented, making fifty horses in the ring at once.  
A Yeager of Simcoe was the winner and his horse preceded in this order: Bold Ebenham, Redprocity, St. Wilfrid, Earl Grey, Fielding, Warwick Queen, Warwick Princess, Eye Opener, Lookout, Blue Nose, certainly a beautiful showing of handsome light bay of the hackney variety.  
Sir Henry Pellett was second with his classy carriage horse, and Crow & Murray third. The other exhibitors were Miss Willis and J. L. Reid & Sons.  
The exhibit of show horses this year totaled 73, the largest number ever shown at a regular fair in the world, and it is doubtful if the number was ever exceeded at a world's exposition.  
The big review of prize-winning was again a great spectacle and the large crowd who witnessed the march past from the main stand were generous in their applause.  
A beautiful white Jetherson stallion, with a long magnificent flowing mane and tail, came in for much favorable comment.

Graham Renfrew's Clydesdale winners also looked well and presented a good appearance when lined up in front of the stand.  
The cattle winners were all brought in and when bunched showed the class of animals Canadian farmers are now breeding, animals that will keep Canada foremost in the breeding line.

The exhibit of Ayrshire cattle was large, in fact the largest in years, and the class was also there as well as numbers.

This year's exhibit of horses and cattle has been one that the directors of the fair should be justly proud of, for it has never been exceeded and the record established this year will be a hard one to beat in future shows to follow.
