Such Is Assertion of Vienna Paper -More Reservists Are Called to Arms.

VIENNA. Nov. 29.-The assertion that Servia is mobilizing against Austria-Hungary is made today by The Reichspost. The entrenched positions near the Town of Semendria, on the Danube, have been occupied already by Servian troops of the Danube Division. Servian recruits belonging to contingents due to be called up in 1913 and 1914 have been called out by the Servian war office, and Christian prisoners among the Turkish troops captured are being induced to serve in the Servian army. serve in the Servian army.

HICKEY TELLS OF MURDERING BOYS

ard Unhinged Mind and Drove Him to Commission of Crimes.

BUFFALO, Nov. 28.—(Can. Press.)
—The accidental killing of a man in Lowell, Mass., twenty years ago, was given tonight by John F. Hickey, in a signed confession as the starting point of a career of debauchery and crime, that covered a period of twenty years, during which he murdered two boys and assaulted many others. Hickey's vietims, according to his confession, were Ed. Morey of Lowell, Mass., poisoned with laudanum over twenty years ago; Michael Kruck, twelve years old, a New York newsboy, strangled in Central Park, in 1992 and Joseph Joseph, seven years cld, the son of George Joseph, a merchant of Lackawanna, killed in a similar manner, October 12, 1911. cha, the son of George Joseph, a merchant of Lackawanna, killed in a similar manner, October 12, 1911.

"The details of Hickey's last two crimes are too revolting to make public," said District Attorney Dudley. "Hickey apparently is a man with a dual personality. He is intelligent. He is now overcome with remorse and says again and again that he can't comprehend what possessed him to commit the crimes, He asserts that he became a manic only when filled with whiskey."

Told of Outrages.

Hickey was taken to the district attorney's office, where, in the presence of Mr. Dudley, the sheriff and a stenographer, he again, went over the details of his crimes. In addition to the murders. Hickey confessed to many assaults and attempted assaults
