St. Catharines, Sept. 2 .- (Special.)-The contract for street lighting expires in November, and there is much opp si-tion to a renewal on anything like the present terms. The lighting is done by the Lincoln Electric Light & Power Co.. an off-shoot of the Cataract Power Company of Hamilton, the price being \$72 for each of eighty-six street lamps.
