HOUSES WRECKED

ner of Keele and Annette-streets was uprooted. Lightning struck the residence of Thomas Townsend, on Western-avenue, shattering the chimney and damaging the roof and the walls of the attic. It made its exit by the front door.

In the district north of Bloor-street and West of Shaw-street, where co-operative building is going on, at least four houses were wrecked. Hall also fell.

On Emerson-avenue a two-story house blown entirely from its stone foundations.

On Wallace-avenue two houses were partially destroyed.

On Shaw-street, about 100 yards above Bloor, a two-story house was also blown over and destroyed.

A tent at the corner of Empresson and Bloor-streets, where revival meetings are held, was swept away.

Along Bloor-street the road was littered with fallen limbs of trees, and Wells Hill also suffered heavily.

In Riverside, a two-story house being built on Hogarth-avenue—another enterprise on the part of a home-builder—was scattered on the ground.

Downtown in Denison-square, one of the two big elms was demolished.

On Temperance-street a poplar tree, one of the many which were planted sixty years ago, broke off close to the base. Had it been five seconds later a fatality might have happened, as an auto in which were W. S. Smith and A. C. Chatterton was just leaving the garage when the tree came down almost beside them. In its descent it carried down a telephone wire, and the wires, and also badly twisted the electric display sign of the Star Theatre. The tree was about 15 inches in diameter, but was nearly rotten through the trunk only an inch or two of sound wood extending about half way round.

A large tree in front of Elm-street was split in two and the park commissioner's men did a rope around the tree to prevent it falling. At 33 Elm-street a piece was taken off the roof.

The sign of the Toronto Baseball Club, stretched across Yonge-street, was tipped in two.

One of the heaviest electrical and rain storms of the season passed over Little York yesterday. The rain fell in torrents, while one high wind did considerable damage. A number of silos in different parts of the Township of York and Scarborough were blown down, one on the old Taylor farm on the York townline, while fences were scattered in all directions.

Near the lake front two houses in course of erection were blown down, one near Greenwood-avenue and another at New Beach.

The rain, while it lasted, in the storm section, was terrific, and the gutters overflowed. Six-tenths of an inch of rain is the official record. The Queen and King-street subways and Tannery Hollow had six or eight inches of water, but the cars were not bothered. The subway at Gerrard-street, near Pape-avenue, however, collected over a foot of water and blocked traffic for some time.

WANT CHEAPER LIGHT.

Cataract Contract for St. Kitts Streets Expires in November.

St. Catharines, Sept. 2.—(Special.)—The contract for street lighting expires in November, and there is much opposition to a renewal on anything like the present terms. The lighting is done by the Lincoln Electric Light & Power Co., an off-shoot of the Cataract Power Company of Hamilton, the price being \$2 for each of eight-six street lamps.

From past performances the council is likely to give the Cataract Company anything it asks, but there is likely to be a kick if there is not a substantial reduction in the cost to the city.

The Star, referring to the question, observes:

"With St. Catharines holding nearly a one-third interest in the St. Catharines Gas Company with a Natural Gas Company with headquarters here, looking for business, with the immense electrical development works that are located in this immediate vicinity, and with the possibility of the city's undertaking the lighting of its streets as a municipal enterprise, the city is certainly in a position to light her streets at a lower figure than that now paid, and doubtless all phases of the question will be thoroughly investigated before the council takes final action in the matter."

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

GIVE COMPANY TILL TO DAY TO GRANT ARBITRATION

Serious Hitch in Negotiations With Cataract Company and Strike May Result.

Hamilton, Sept. 2.—(Special.)—There is a serious hitch in the street railway trouble to-night, which may precipitate a strike to-morrow morning. Judging from the statements given out by the company and the men the hitch is due to a blunder or a misunderstanding. The union representatives state that they have given the company until to-morrow morning to sign the arbitration agreement, or there will be no strike. The company claims that it has not been given a chance to sign the agreement, although it is quite willing to do so.

A meeting was held on Saturday afternoon between the company and the representatives of the employees of the three electric lines, at which J. M. Gibson, president of the Cataract Power Co., was present. The object of the meeting was to see if Mr. Gibson would consent to an increase in the wages as requested by the men, viz., four cents an hour. Mr. Gibson refused to make any such increase, and it was understood that the matter would be left to arbitration.

A meeting of the men was held at midnight Saturday. The committee reported that the company had not signed the arbitration agreement. There was a strong feeling among those present that they had held off long enough, and that it was time for a strike, especially as the company appeared to want to strike.

When seen to-night Traction Manager Green stated that no ultimatum had been made by the men to the company. He said after the meeting on Saturday afternoon President Theaker and J. Lamond of the union presented a copy of the arbitration agreement to the company for consideration. G. H. Levy, the company's solicitor, looked over the agreement and after making a few minor changes in the wording, which was satisfactory to the men, the agreement was accepted and Mr. Green offered to sign it. President Theaker, however, would not allow him to sign it before it went before the meeting on Monday. When the company learned of the action of the meeting it refused to sign the agreement on Sunday for fear of legal technicalities. As a result of the agreement would be signed before morning, Mr. Green refused to sign it. He stated, however, that the company did not want to inconvenience the public to-morrow morning. There would be a lot of people wanting to get away who would be greatly inconvenienced if they had no cars to carry them to the trains and boats. His manner indicated that the company would sign the agreement before morning.

General Manager Hawkins was loath to discuss the question when spoken to to-night. He thought there would be no trouble, however.

Mrs. Grainger Dead.

Mrs. Mary Grainger of Stony Creek died yesterday afternoon after a long illness since last Tuesday. She was 72 years old, and had been a resident of Stony Creek for many years. Two sons and three daughters survive. The funeral will take place to-morrow at 2 p. m. from the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Black, to Stony Creek burying ground.

The fire department had a busy time on Saturday evening, responding to alarms, but fortunately there was no serious danger from fire. The Gurney-Tilden Co.'s factory on John-street was badly damaged by water, however, which was caused by the sprinkler system. About 9 o'clock the watchmen discovered water running down from the top stories of the building. He thought the water mains had broken, and he endeavored to turn off the water. It was discovered that the roof was on fire, which had set the sprinkler system in operation. The water soaked thru the floors and did a great deal of damage. One of the companies from Central fire station was called out, and the blaze, which had been kept in check by the sprinklers, was soon extinguished. Although the damage from water will be large, had it not been for the sprinkler system, a serious fire would have resulted.

The flickering of the fire in on even at the Hamilton Electric Co. building, non-street created the impression that the building was on fire. A company from the central station responded, and while responding to an alarm from Adelaide-street, shortly before 8 o'clock, the "Sophia-street Company" collided with a farmer's wagon on King-William-street, throwing the fire horses down and slightly injuring the wagon.
