WANT FRUIT INSPECTOR. Grocers' Section of Retail Merchants

Voice Their Indignation. The grocers section of the Retail Merchants' Association held their first

monthly meeting of the fall season last night. The report of the joint committee of fruit dealers, butchers and grocers was received re the appointment

of a fruit inspector, and the decision reached was that a representative should visit Ottawa and lay the facts before the Hon. Mr. Fisher. There was quite a discussion ove the very unsatisfactory yield of the fruit this season. It was stated that

it has been the poorest yield for the last twenty years, and that the fruit has been dearer in proportion to the scarcity than has been ever known to the knowldge of those present.

Complaints were made that of the large quantities of fruit which came in the bottom layer was much poor er than the top, and this is one of the greatest needs for a fruit inspector.
