Under the proposed ar-rangement, which would give the dis-trict the postal facilities now enjoyed by the suburbs of the city, and bring it into close touch with the business world, the 'bus would leave Dunbarton at 8 in the morning, and, picking up the mail bags left there by the train, drop them at the various postoffices on its route west to the city.
