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When completed the power-house will be 174 feet in length and 42 feet in width, and the walls 30 feet in height. It is to be constructed through-out of steel faced with brick, and having a concrete floor, and the roof will be made of concrete.

The ground for the site was broken and the foundations for the concrete walls were laid, and the walls raised to the level of the surface of the ground. The material used for the foundations is a hard and durable stone quarried on the face of the site, some 200 feet directly above the building, and brought down by means of a hoist, and set in place with hydraulic cement.

The concrete work at the site is being done in a very efficient manner, and the materials used, so far, are native, and the work is being done in a very efficient manner.

Five Thousand Horse Power. In this power-house, it is proposed to develop electricity to the extent of 5000 horse power, all of which, it is estimated, the power house will be able to generate.

The power will be generated by means of a dynamo sufficient for the purpose, with a water wheel which will drive the dynamo, and a large turbine, which will drive the water wheel.
