**THE UNIVERSITY QUESTION.**  
The scheme of university federation, which was adopted some years ago, was based on the idea that it was in the public interest to have a great teaching institution rather than a number of small and poorly-equipped colleges. The object aimed at was the concentration of the various theological colleges in the neighborhood of the university, the abandonment by them of their arts faculties, and their federation with Toronto University, as far as the arts department was concerned. The idea was to relieve the denominations of the expense connected with the education of their students in purely secular subjects. University College, endowed by the State, would be accessible to students of all religious denominations for their education in arts. The Presbyterians, the Roman Catholics and a section of the Anglican Church fell in with the scheme, and as far as they are concerned, the project has been worked out satisfactorily. Knox College is a purely theological institution. Its students receive all their secular education at Toronto University and University College. Wycliffe and St. Michael's colleges occupy the same relation towards Toronto University as does Knox College. But the Methodists and Baptists have not seen their way clear to abandon their arts departments. Each has an arts faculty, and each possesses degrees in divinity. McMaster University continues to grant degrees, and Victoria College, while not now granting degrees in arts, can revive its power to do so at any moment. It still continues to maintain an arts faculty, and is very ambitious to attract students in its arts department. Victoria is not content with being a theological college. It insists on having an arts department of its own, where the young men and women of the Methodist denomination receive their higher secular education. It was thought when Victoria entered federation that it would gradually drop its arts department and confine itself to theology. The anti-theological forces of the Province, the "ward movement" is diametrically opposed to the scheme of federation as adopted. Instead of one central teaching body, the gentlemen who are in the onward movement want to see each college have an arts faculty of its own. Chancellor Burwash seems to think it is only by adopting a policy of disintegration that Trinity and McMaster Universities can be induced to enter federation. The onward movement was realized, we would have expected something like this: One university, with a teaching faculty and degree-conferring powers, and half a dozen arts colleges, all more or less covering the same ground. These colleges would comprise Victoria, McMaster, Trinity and University Colleges—three denominational and one national. Chancellor Burwash, who represents the onward movement, further says that these colleges should be an absolutely self-sufficient in their relation to the University. The State college is to have no preference. There is to be a leveling up or leveling down until the colleges are all on an equal footing. Chancellor Burwash's idea is to subject the State colleges to competition, and the fiercer the competition the more he approves of it. Instead of having only one competitor, as at present, Chancellor Burwash would have four competitors to start with, and later on he could, no doubt, induce the Presbyterians and the Anglican Church to get arts colleges of their own, so that, when the onward movement is in full swing, we will have six distinct colleges, all covering the same ground, and then the competition among the people's colleges, how will it be? The onward movement has better be described as a movement to sandbag the Provincial college.

lege, and graft the denominational colleges onto the State. Why should the State help to nurse into existence a brood of rivals that will finally rob it of its vitality? The onward movement does not represent a new idea. It is an old friend in new attire. It means a reversion to the days gone by, when the church ruled the State in educational matters. It is in line with our Separate School exorcism. The onward movement is an aggressive, and the denominations to graft on the State. The onward movement is reactionary. It seeks to place this Province where it was 50 years ago. The World was right the other day when it attributed Chancellor Blake's resignation to the smaller influence of this onward movement. Mr. Blake's resignation was a protest against such reactionary proposals as have been announced by Chancellor Burwash. He saw that a blow was being struck at federation as carried by him, and as he is not here on the ground to oppose the reactionaries, he has resigned, in order to escape responsibility for their action. While the reactionaries are talking big and urging their scheme on the attention of the politicians, we do not see the speaker who can carry out their scheme. Principal Sheraton of Wycliffe College is not in favor of competitive arts colleges, nor is the faculty of Knox College. Trinity and McMaster may favor the idea, but a great majority of the people are against it. The reactionaries are not the church on the authority of the State. We have no doubt powerful influences will be set at work to secure the Government's approval of the alleged onward movement, when the people are the reactionaries. The nature of the scheme they will run: such a howl as will compel the Government to drop it like hot cakes.

**ONTARIO FORESTRY REPORT.**  
The annual Forestry Report for Ontario for 1899 has just been issued, and presents many interesting features. It is handsomely illustrated with representations of forest scenes and lumbering operations, and deals largely with the Provincial Government's timber reserve policy, urging the desirability of keeping in timber such areas of the Crown Domain as are not adapted for farming. The report is a very valuable one, and is well worth a perusal. Mr. Southworth's view is that our timber need never be exhausted, and that the 20,000 square miles now under license might be a source of steady revenue for all time, provided lumbering is properly controlled, and fire and squatters excluded. The report gives some information as to Forest Reserve lately set apart in Addington and Frontenac counties where there is a heavy and promising growth of young pine trees, which ought to be worth some ten million dollars half a century hence, if properly managed and safeguarded. Some good suggestions are given to the farmers as to the advantages to be derived from the planting of trees on their farms. The report also contains a list of the names of the foresters employed by the Provincial Government during the year, and a list of the names of the foresters who have been promoted during the year. The report is a very valuable one, and is well worth a perusal.
