BURTON WILL STAND BY THEM
LET THE BOARD NOW BE BRAVE

Auditor Scott Discovers that Lane's Total Shortage is \$5309—Own Salary Overdrawn \$375, Salaries of Assistants \$2183, All Within Eighteen Months.

Hamilton, Feb. 14.—(Special.)—The funniest thing in connection with the Public Library treasurer's report of last week, was the fact that the board this afternoon, W. F. Burton, who was chairman of the Finance Committee last year, and who signed most of the duplicate cheques, arose and made a statement—a statement that was not satisfactory to his colleagues on the board. He said the press had demanded his resignation. Continuing, he said: "I am no coward. I will not resign. I will stand by the members of the board in their trouble." Some of the members hardly kept from laughing at him.

Shortage \$5,309.00.
The report prepared by Auditor Scott was presented at the meeting. As far as he could discover the total shortage is \$5,309.00. Lane's salary was overdrawn by means of duplicate cheques, \$2,375, and the salary of the assistants was overdrawn to the extent of \$2,934. This covers a period of 18 months. Besides this, there was the government grant, \$200; estimated value of \$400; and rent received for rooms in the building, \$150.

Other business was transacted at the meeting. It was decided to hold a meeting of the Finance Committee of the board on Thursday evening and a meeting of the board on Wednesday afternoon.

Treasurer Mr. Lane.
Although the Library Board has declined to take out a warrant for the arrest of Mr. H. T. Lane, the treasurer, the board has been trying to keep track of him. His movements between Thursday of last week and Friday morning of this week are pretty well known. Lane left Toronto late on Thursday night, and arrived in Hamilton on Friday morning. He is reported to have been in the city at that time and Sunday it appears he was under cover. On Saturday night and Sunday he was in his home in Hamilton. Monday morning he left Hamilton and returned to Toronto on Tuesday night. That evening he was driven to Burlington by E. W. Cleverly, Mr. Lane's driver. On Saturday Lane left Burlington and returned to Toronto on Sunday. Mr. Lane advanced money to cover a shortage in his accounts with the Hendrie & Co. store, which was taken out to Burlington Junction in a closed sleigh, and got passage on last week and returned to Toronto on Sunday. It is thought the presence of the city of Inspector Frost, of the city of Hamilton, who is Lane's friend, and they urged Lane to leave Toronto.

Lane left Toronto on Sunday morning in the caboose of a G.T.R. freight train. Lane had his mustache taken off and his hair cut short. Instead of a bow tie he wore a white shirt with a bow tie.

Librarian Bain outlined a scheme whereby young people could improve their knowledge of Canadian birds. He proposes to remove the historical pictures in the main entrance and replace them with 70 or 80 engravings, which were presented to the board some years ago by the late John Hallam. The board approved of the scheme, and instructed Mr. Bain to report upon the cost of suitable frames for the pictures. It was decided to purchase 200 volumes at a cost of \$278.

T. W. BANTON IS CHAIRMAN.

Library Board Organizes and Discusses a New Site.
T. W. Banton, representative of the City Council, was unanimously elected chairman at the inaugural meeting of the Public Library Board, held last night. Committees were appointed as follows:

Library—T. Kelly, chairman; R. H. Graham, W. T. Lee, Judge McDougall, Building and Finance—S. W. Burns, chairman; J. H. Denton, R. H. Graham and Frank Somers.

Mr. Banton, in returning thanks for the honor conferred on him, endorsed the proposal of Judge McDougall, and at the last meeting, advised the board to take steps to bring before the City Council a request to provide funds for a new building. His friend suggested that night that the new building should be near the Technical School, and R. H. Graham observed that the government might be induced to donate the land, providing the city put up the building. Then the matter was allowed to drop.

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BRITAIN'S REPLY TO GERMANY.

Captain Chichester's Report on the Dewey-Von Diederich Incident to Be It.
HOPE THIS MAY TURN THE TABLES

Anglo-American Concord Very Near and Dear to the People of England.

New York, Feb. 14.—In a special from London The Journal says: It is expected that the British government will make public the report of Captain Chichester of the cruiser Immortal, Admiral Dewey's dispatch to him by Admiral Dewey, in connection with the German publications of Ambassador Pauncoff's communication, which was made to appear as hostile to the United States.

The publication by Germany of Lord Pauncoff's note, suggested just before the outbreak of the Spanish-American war, has caused great anxiety throughout England. Whatever the secret attitude of the officials and diplomats, there is no question as to the feeling of the public. There has not been a time since the war began that the American flag has not been cheered and music hall. The Anglo-American concord is a very dear and real thing to the British masses, and the disclosure of the Ambassador's position is all the more bitter.

Not one word was obtained from the government to-night officially. The answer to Germany's note is being formulated, and the government will risk no premature disclosure of the broadside that everybody is made public. The greatest curiosity exists as to whether the government will disavow the use of which forms the foundation of the note. The best way is to see the lost harmony between our physical habits and the laws of nature.
