Toronto, April 19 .- Yesterday a deputation representing the Grand Trunk the country. The gunboats are assist-Railway strikers, interviewed Chief ing. Clerk Mullen, of Superintendent Fitzhugh's office, and asked if the views expressed by Superintendent Fitzhugh on Saturday last upon the matter of the demanded increase in wages had been altered since that time. Mr. Mullen replied that, while Superintendent Fitzhugh was out of the city, he knew that that gentleman's ideas had undergone no change, and that his attitude was still that the company could not at the present time make the advance asked. This ended the interview. The strikers have made no move since, and as the railway company appears to be moving its freight, the trouble seems to be, for the present at least, at an end. If any proposition looking towards an arbitration is made, the railway officials will reply that as the former porters are no longer in their employ, there is nothing to arbitrate.

BRICKLAYERS AND LABORERS. Toronto, April 19.-As the days pass the possibilities of a strike of bricklayers and their laborers increases. The former are holding out firmly for an advance to 40 cents and hour, and the employers are showing equal firmness so far in refusing. Another meeting of the local Bricklayers' Union was held in St. John's Hall last night. It closed early, as the situation presented no new points for discussion. It was announced that no intimation had been received from the bosses since the offer of 36 cents per hour. The Matter Discussed by the Argents-General.

Awful Ravages of the Plague in Bombay and Kurrache.

London, April 19.-Upon the invitation of Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, the agents-general of Canada, South Africa and Australia met in the high commissioner's office yesterday afternoon to discuss the chancellor of the exchequer's proposal to increase the duties on colonial wines, and to impose a new duty of 5 shillings on colonial bonds and stocks. Cablegrams from Ottawa, reporting the discussion in the Dominion House of Commons, gave special interest to the proceedings, but it transpired during the discussion that the new duties will not affect the Dominion or provincial loans issued and registered in England, which already are heavily taxed, but will only affect local bonds and stocks issued and made payable in the colonies when negotiated in the United Kingdom. The opinion was general at the meeting that the colonial government bonds should secure more favorable treatment of colonial as distinct from foreign bonds, but it was found necessary to await the issue of the chancellor's bill in order to see the exact text of the proposals before taking official action.

FEARFUL RAVAGES OF PLAGUE. According to statistics gathered regarding the bubonic plague, it is established that there have been 250,000 offices. deaths recorded in India since its beginning. These figures, however, are undoubtedly far below the actual total, as the natives are known to have concealed quite a number of deaths. Bombay Presidency suffered the most, being responsible for 134,000 deaths, without counting those which occurred in the city of Bombay, which, with Kurrache, were the chief hotbeds of the disease. The deaths in Bombay Presidency are still about 1,000 weekly. With the return of hot weather the plaugue, which is now the third epidemic, is again rapidly disapearing, and the mortality, which was 250 daily in the city of Bombay five weeks ago, has now sunk to 100 per day. MOVED. The insurgent government is reported to have been removed to 47 miles north, to Tarlace. A board has been appointed to determine the validity of the military operations, which are being negotiated by the foreign consula at Iloilo and Manila.

GEN. SHAFTER SEES TROUBLE. Chicago, April 19.-Major-Gen. Shafter passed through Chicago en route to his brother's home in Sycambre, Ill. He was much improved in health. Dis-

cussing the Philippine war, he said: "If Gen. Lawton states that 100,000 men are needed in the Philippines in order to effectually end hostilities and bring the natives to terms, I should say that undoubtedly an army of such proportions is required. We of the army have supreme confidence in Gen. Lawton's judgment, and it is his practice to underestimate rather than to exaggerate when passing upon existing

conditions. The Filipino is a suspicious fellow, just like the Cuban. He can't see the good intentions of this government, and he never will until we subjugate him with powder and ball. I have said before that it may be nece half the population of the islands in order that the remaining half may be lifted from their semi-barbarity to the civilization we are ready to give them. And let me tell you," General Shafter concluded impressively, "that I do not

believe our troubles in Cuba are over by any means."

HOW IT HAPPENED. Manila, April 19-4:35 p.m.-Admiral Dewey has been notified of the strange disappearance of Lieut. J. C. Gilmore and fourteen members of the crew of the United States gunboat Yorktown. On Saturday last the Yorktown anchored off Baler, on the east coast of Santa Domingo and set the Spanish Luzon Island, and about 200 miles from here, where there was a Spanish garrison of about 50 men, which had been defending itself against several hundred Filipinos for months past. Lieut. Gilmore, Ensign W. H. Standley and a boat's crew were sent up the river from Baler Bay to communicate with the Spaniards, the town of Baler

being some distance inland. Ensign Standley, who landed at the mouth of the river, reports that he heard three volleys, a bugle call and cheers from up the river, but that the automatic gun, which was part of the equipment of the boat, was not heard firing. Standley later paddled to the Yorktown boat in a canoe. A search was afterwards made for the Yorktown's boat and her crew but no town's boat and her crew, but traces of them were found, and the Yorktown sailed from Iloilo, from which place her commander cabled to Admiral Dewey his theories that the Filipinos had captured or sunk boat or that the Spaniards had rescued the American party.
