The Londons are well up in the entire list.

In fielding, the biggest surprise is Carey's average. He had more chances than any other fielder, becaue those in advance of him in put outs, played infield positions. Jones and Conklin, who have more chances, occupied infield positions in several games. average is an excellent one, considering Congalton's, as a comparison, who heads the fielders with .924. Carey's errors were nearly all made on the

home grounds. Keenan leads the third basemen, having the smallest number of chances of the four players, as Rodden only played in 41 games to Keen-


