Paris, June 15.—A semi-official note says that the German submarine U-23, which was towed into Cadiz on June 11, was operating outside that port. On June 12 a Norwegian steamer was torpedoed off Huelva, and a Russian mailer between Larache and Cadiz, which leads to the belief that a group of submarines has been sent to blockade the ports of Cadiz and Huelva.

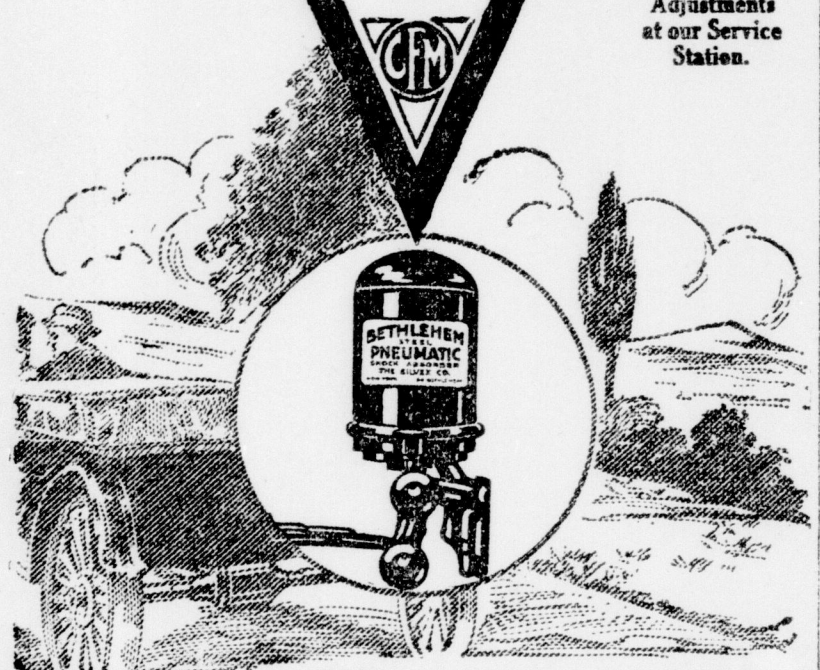

FREE FIGHT PROMISED
AT ANTI-CONSCRIPTION
MEETING IN WINNIPEG

Police Do Not Want Responsibility This Afternoon.

WINNIPEG, June 15.—Prospects of a free fight, if not voting, loom up here for Sunday afternoon. Winnipeg anti-conscriptors will hold a public meeting at 2 o'clock on the market square. Ald. J. Queen announced today. The question of who will preserve order at the meeting is agitating the civic officials. Police heads assert it is up to the military authorities to prevent disorder, while the military officials are said to hold the belief that it is a job for the city police, as it is a civilian meeting.

TURKEY HAS PROMISED
SAFETY TO MISSIONARIES

Desires "In Everything To Act As Gentlemen."

BOSTON, June 15.—Assurances from the Turkish Government as to the safety of missionaries and mission property in that country were received by the American board of commissioners for foreign missions through the state department advices from the American ministers at Bern and Stockholm.

A statement given out by the board tonight said that the Swedish legation at Constantinople had learned from the Turkish foreign office that buildings of American institutions would not be occupied by the Turks and "that it devolved in everything to act as gentlemen toward the missions." It was stated further that arrangements were being made for the missionaries traveling to the coast in groups. The colleges at Constantinople and Beirut are now open and at work again. Three of the American boards fifteen centres of work in Turkey, Thrace, Syria and Brousa, are now abandoned and their staffs are at Constantinople or on the way to that city.

A LIAR, PLUMP
AND PLAINLY, IN
HOUSE OF PARLT.

And Man Who Hurls Epithet Is Not Called to Order.

MINISTER GETS GRILLING

Would Reward Author of Seditious Matter With Government Job.

QUEBEC IS STORM CENTRE

Liberals Refuse to Vote Estimates to "Such a Minister."

[Special to The Advertiser.]

OTTAWA, June 15.—The youngest member of the Government, Mr. Seigney, today was the centre of one of the liveliest rackets that Parliament has seen since the naval debate. The acting chairman of committee, Richard Blain, backed up by the ruling of Speaker Rhodes, and he had to have the backing of the Government majority.

The old question of the loyalty and otherwise of the province of Quebec was the basis of the row. Mr. Blain was put out of the chair, and the authorized chairman, Mr. Raliville, was put in. Mr. Seigney was called "a young liar" openly, and the man who used the words was not called to order. Mr. Seigney spent the afternoon evening trying to get inland revenue estimates voted by his department; but when the House adjourned the Opposition did not grant a dollar.

Warming Up, or a Blow-Off?

After the vote, Mr. Blain called this a warning up or a blow-off in the debate of this debate.

A few minutes after the inland revenue estimates were called, Ernest Lapointe, the Liberal representative of Kamouraska, asked Mr. Seigney a series of questions, and the minister's answer was that he had recommended the appointment, as accountant of his department, of Raoul Renault, editor of Le France Parleur, Quebec. He did not say that because the civil service commission interfered.

Mr. Lapointe said that Renault had published violent articles against the

appointed. Mr. Seigney explained that an error had been made previously in the estimates and a vote of \$10,000 secured instead of \$154,000. The Government had accordingly taken the \$54,000 from the war funds.

BRITAIN VIEWS CHINA
DIFFERENTLY FROM U.S.

LONDON, June 15.—Great Britain today dispatched to the United States a reply to a note addressed to the Allied powers, inviting them to associate themselves with the United States note to China, which expressed regret at China's internal political difficulties and hoped that internal peace soon would be restored.

The British answer, which is of considerable length and carefully framed,

Seigney's Diplomacy.

When asked why he had sought the appointment of a man who had publicly expressed such views as those of Raoul Renault, Mr. Seigney said: "In my opinion, it was certainly regrettable to have in that paper, especially during this crisis, certain articles and to put an end to that, I thought it would be a good thing to close the paper."

Then the storm broke.

"By giving him Government job," said E. M. MacDonald.

"You necessarily a good job," said Mr. Seigney. "But this time it would be in the public interest if papers like Le France Parleur or La Liberté (Tancrède Marcell's) were closed or other papers were closed at the present time."

Why Overlook Marcell?

"Is Marcell to get a Government job, too?"

"If I give him a job it will be in jail," said Mr. Seigney. He added that he owed nothing to Renault, but that he had the job only to close the paper. "I thought it would be a good thing if such a paper could be put out of existence in this crisis."

Mr. Seigney put him in jail you would reward him with a Government appointment," said Mr. MacDonald.

"Why not make Raoul Renault a deputy minister?" said A. K. MacLean.

Hon. Frank Oliver said that at Saint Ste. Marie a paper had been closed for its anti-recruiting utterances. In Quebec such utterances were rewarded.

"And we wonder that recruiting has not been larger in Quebec," said Mr. MacDonald.

It was at this point that Mr. Lapointe sought to read some of the Le France Parleur articles, and was ruled out of order.

Storm Around Blain.

The ruling did not stop the row, and Mr. Blain was openly charged with having given an unfair ruling, and with having inaccurately reported the case to the speaker.

The speaker had to rule up what was before him, and the ruling which sustained the speaker was a straight party one, and the ministers were cheered as they voted in defence of the minister who had confessed to recommending such an appointment.

After the vote Mr. Blain got back into the chair, but Hon. Charles Marcell objected, saying that the regular chairman was in the chair, and should take his place. Mr. Blain then left the chair in favour of Mr. Raliville, and the "free-for-all" really commenced.

"If it is the policy of the government to discourage volunteering, it should be a policy that deserves condemnation. If the ministers of the crown are thus putting a premium on the conduct of people who are urging the young men of Quebec not to enlist, that readily explains the state of recruiting in that province. This method of dealing with people who make seditious speeches and write seditious articles in the province of Quebec will put this Government in a very peculiar position before the people of this country."

Nationalist Has Repented.

Mr. Seigney said that Renault was a qualified man, but that he had a personal difference with Sir William Price, who was recruiting. Lack of recruits from Quebec was due to speeches by such men as his late opponent, Mr. Cannon. Mr. Seigney admitted that at one time he had made anti-British appeals himself, but he regretted having done so. "Since the war broke out, I have done the best I could to secure Canada's participation."

Mr. Knowles said that anti-British appeals made five years ago might still be having an effect.

Mr. Seigney said that in 1911 he had strongly opposed the naval policy, but had "never made appeals against Britain."

This statement was challenged by Mr. Lapointe, who said that he had heard Mr. Seigney say in the platform: "The bill mentions the navy of his majesty. Who is his majesty? We have no majesty in Canada."

D. D. MacKenzie declared that the principles enunciated by Mr. Seigney were startling, that many men whose conduct was such as to make him a danger to the country—a firebrand—had to be given the King's money and the King's office in order to take him out of the way. He was surprised as the minister himself was a product of that line of action and owed his position in the cabinet to it.

The Trouble In Quebec.

Mr. Lapointe said that for years there had been an anti-British campaign in the province of Quebec, directed against Sir Wilfrid Laurier, on the ground that he was too British. Armand Lavergne, Tancrède Marcell and Mr. Seigney were all engaged in this delightful line of conduct.

Hon. Charles Marcell said that the articles in Le France Parleur had not attacked recruiting generally, but had attacked the manner in which the militia department had treated French-Canadian recruits in the province of Quebec.

W. E. Knowles of Moose Jaw declared that Parliament should not vote a cent to a minister who followed the policy enunciated by Mr. Seigney.

"If people are to be told that to get a fat Government job they have only to make a national peril of themselves, we are a laughing-stock in spending the people's money."

A second round for refusing the money was that the minister declared that the Liberals of Quebec, more than half the people of that province, were disloyal. That was an insult to the people of Quebec to say that they are disloyal and desired to be opposed to Britain in this war.

Opposed to Such a Minister.

"He is a member of the Government whose influence makes toward disunity and discord, and faction in Canada. I am opposed, not only to giving this vote to this minister, but I am opposed to granting, joining or co-operating or concurring in any vote to this minister."

Mr. Seigney angrily declared: "The great majority of the people are as loyal to the British Empire and the cause of the war as he himself (Mr. Knowles), or anyone in his right mind."

"You did not say that a minute ago," said Mr. Knowles.

Mr. Seigney said that he had recently been attacked by Le Devoir.

"And I am told that there was a meeting in Montreal last Sunday between Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Henri Bourassa," said Mr. Seigney.

"You are a liar, that's what you are!" shouted E. M. MacDonald, and in the excitement he was not called to order.

"Well, that's what I am told," said Mr. Seigney.

"Sir Wilfrid Laurier was not in Montreal last Sunday," he was in Ottawa," said Mr. Seigney.

"Well, I said the interview was in Ottawa," said Mr. Seigney.

There was a chorus of "Liar!" from the Liberal side.

E. M. MacDonald, who had left the chamber, returned, and said that he had been authorized by Sir Wilfrid to state that he had no meeting with Henri Bourassa, and on the demand of Mr. MacDonald, Seigney withdrew the statement.

Later in the night sitting A. K. MacLean, in calling for an explanation of an item of \$54,000, found it was to pay additional preventive officers recently

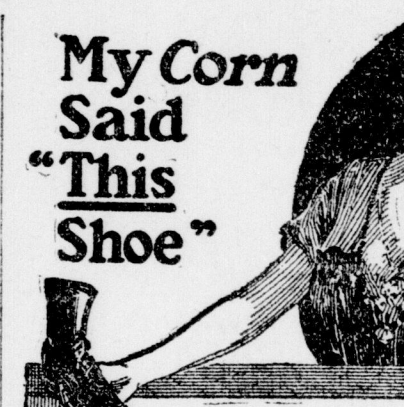
JOINS ARTILLERY UNIT.
