MISHAP TO A TROLLEY

Results in a Young Man Having an Arm Broken.

Climbing trees is not on the programme for street cars, but the London line thought that the Toronto line should not have all the honors in this respect, so it got busy on Saturday evening.

An Oxford car, No. 70, left Dundas and Richmond street about 7 o'clock, running north, just after starting, one of the flanges became loose, unknown by the motorman, but the car ran smoothly enough until near Queen's avenue the flange broke off, and the car headed for the woods. It swung to the left, crossed the other track and ran nearly 100 feet before it stopped. A telegraph pole in front of the Merchants Bank intercepted the trolley.

Charles Barker, a young Italian, was standing on the rear platform of the car, and the swinging of the trolley threw him violently to the pavement. It was thought at first that he was seriously injured, but an examination at Victoria Hospital showed that his arm was dislocated and one elbow hurt. His injuries are not considered serious.

Several other passengers were rudely jolted, but were not hurt.

GREENBAUM MAY CAUSE TROUBLE

Alleged Thief Threatens to Fight Canadian Authorities Over His Arrest.

Because he was arrested on American soil by Canadian detectives, Jacob Greenbaum, the man who was arrested at Detroit, on Friday, and brought to this city on Saturday night, to stand trial on a charge of stealing silk from a local wholesale, threatens to cause trouble over his extradition.

He threatens to appeal his case to the United States courts, and it is feared that complications may arise.

It appears that Greenbaum stopped at a Windsor hotel on Friday morning, after having made arrangements to have his trunks sent to Niagara, with the evident intention of crossing the line at that point.

In some way another Greenbaum found out that the London officers were in Windsor, and immediately made for the Detroit side of the river. He got onto a ferry, and, as he thought, was getting away from the police.

The authorities followed him to the ferry. They found that he had bought a ticket, but could not find him on the boat. They were about to give up the chase, thinking that he had only bought the ticket to put them off the track, but were assured that he had got onto the ferry, and must be hiding somewhere, so they decided to take a ride over. No sooner had the ferry bumped the American wharf than Greenbaum climbed up from the examiner's hold, and made a bolt for freedom, as he thought on American soil. The detectives arrested him, and he was eventually brought back here.

As he was arrested on the boat before he set foot on American soil, the police are not inclined to take Greenbaum's threats seriously.

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SAVED FROM DROWNING

Willie Bennett, a West London Lad, Rescued by a Companion.

Willie Bennett, a West London lad, was walking along the bank of the Thames west of the Coves Sunday afternoon, when he fell in the water, which is about six feet deep at that point. Young Bennett cannot swim, and he would undoubtedly have drowned had not his companion, Dick O'Rourke, jumped in and pulled him to the shore.

Two boys, paddling a canoe, in the morning, upset the craft further down the river, and they were both thrown into the water. Luckily the water was not deep at the place where the mishap occurred, but both lads were badly frightened.

LAMBTON COUNCIL TO HAVE REUNION

At the Opening of New County Buildings—The Old Boys' Gathering.

Sarnia, June 2.—Warden F. C. Watson has conceived the idea of making the formal opening of the new county buildings on June 6, the occasion of a demonstration. With this view he has issued a circular letter, inviting all the old county and municipal officials to a convention or sort of old boys' reunion to be held during the week of the June session of the county council. The occasion promises to be one of great interest and pleasure, and it is proposed to crown the affair with a banquet at a highly conducive to good fellowship. At 4 o'clock the official opening of the new county buildings will take place. There will be addresses by ex-Wardens Albert Duncan, W. H. McMahon and George A. Proctor (who were the members of the committee in charge of construction). Mr. W. A. Brock, the present chairman of the buildings committee, and Dr. MacLean, registrar of Lambton, and other officials. The dedicatory oration will be delivered by His Honor Judge MacWalter. At 8 o'clock the banquet will be held at the Hotel Northern.

The report of the Sarnia schools shows an attendance during June as follows: Collegiate, on roll 229, average attendance 209, percentage 91; public school, on roll 1,353, average attendance 1,256, percentage 91. There were 155 candidates for entrance and 168 candidates for junior and senior teachers' examinations.

Capt. Hill, of the headquarters staff, military district No. 2, London, inspected the C. I. Cadet Corps last evening and expressed himself as greatly surprised at the steadiness and smart appearance of the corps.

CONFERENCE SURPRISED

Objects to Allowing Hebrews to Carry on Business on Sabbath.

Niagara Falls, June 2.—The Hamilton Methodist Conference, in session here, passed the following resolution, in part:

That while this Hamilton Conference of the Methodist Church, representing almost 20,000 of the people of Ontario, is greatly rejoiced because of the introduction of Parliament of Canada of a bill which will secure to a great number of the citizens of Canada the right to the enjoyment of the privileges and advantages of the Lord's Day.

We are much surprised to learn that amendments have been proposed:

1. To permit the Hebrews of Canada to do certain work and carry on certain business on that day.

2. To widen the privilege of transportation companies, so that they may carry on their business on the Lord's Day practically the same as on other days.

This conference in the very strong way that is possible, places itself on record as being unalterably and unequivocally opposed to these propositions to include an exemption clause for the Hebrews or any further widening of the privileges to transportation companies.

Further, we earnestly hope that neither in the House of Commons nor in the Senate will any amendments be added to the bill which will permit either greed or pleasure to legally despoil any of the citizens of Canada of their God-given heritage of the week-day rest.

QUIET RESTORED TO MEXICO BORDER

U. S. Fighters Save Country-men from Massacre.

THIRTEEN KILLED IN BATTLE

Two Americans and Eleven Mexicans Total List of Dead—Number of Injured Unknown.

El Paso, Tex., June 3.—A reign of terror, lasting for 24 hours, has ended at Cananea, State of Sonora, Mexico. The town is temporarily under the control of armed Americans, commanded by Governor Ysabel, of Sonora. In another 24 hours Mexican troops will be in the city to assist and the Americans will leave.

The American volunteers saved the day, and but for the company of picked men, under the command of Captain Rynning, formerly of the Rough Riders and at present of the Arizona Rangers, the entire American population of Col. W. C. Greene's rich mining camp of three thousand persons would have been butchered.

The men were barricaded in Col. Greene's home when their rescuers arrived and the strikers were par
