

THE SHEPHERD GOVT. OVERTHROWN?

GRAND DUKE NICHOLAS IS PROCLAIMED RUSSIAN CZAR

WHAT IS GOVERNMENT DOING? GUELPH MINISTERS DEMAND; INSIST MACAULEY SHALL TALK

Ministerial Association Will Continue Fight to Have Captain MacAuley Tell His Story in Regard to Jesuit Novitiate—Pastor Kennedy Declares Charges Must Be Sifted to Bottom.

Guelph, June 28.—A public inquiry is the only thing that will clear the air, declared Rev. K. H. Palmer, of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, on his return from Toronto, where he conferred with heads of the evangelical churches upon the Guelph raid. "We must get the mouth of Capt. MacAuley opened," he continued. "At present he is prevented by reason of his position in the army."

"An inquiry is the only means available to get at the facts. Whether the matter goes through the courts or before a board we must hear Capt. MacAuley. It may be some time before we succeed in our efforts, but we don't intend to slacken them the least bit. We are going to see this thing through."

The Real Point.
"The whole point is that some of these men went into the novitiate to escape the act after July 7. There is no doubt about that. I have never budged from that point and I refuse to budge. I have spoken to members of military boards and they all agree that July 6 is the date when the M. S. A. came into operation."

"What is Ottawa hiding? That is what we want the public to know. I know too well what they are hiding, but we are determined to get to the bottom of it the whole affair."

A secret meeting of evangelical alliance representing all Protestant denominations has been called for Tuesday evening next in Central Y. M. C. A., Toronto, when Guelph clergy will disclose all facts in their possession.

VON KUEHLMANN FORCED OUT BY THE WAR CLIQUES

German Foreign Minister Has Tendered His Resignation to the Kaiser.

VICTIM OF PAN-GERMANS
Kaiser Reported Furious Over Minister's Speech in Reichstag.

Paris, June 28.—Dr. von Kuehlmann offered his resignation as German foreign secretary on Wednesday, says a Zurich dispatch to the Journal. The dispatch adds that it is believed the emperor will accept the resignation.

THE "SILKEN CORD."
Amsterdam, June 28.—The campaign for the removal of Foreign Secretary von Kuehlmann is growing in strength. Emperor William is willing to dismiss him, and Chancellor von Hertling is not disposed to retain him, according to dispatches received here.

In a violent attack on the foreign minister in the Reichstag Tuesday, says Vorwarts, suggested that on the receipt of a certain publication, Chancellor von Hertling hurried to the House to open hand von Kuehlmann the "silk cord." Deputy Dr. Kuehlmann described von Hertling, von Kuehlmann and von Payer, the Kaiser's chief advisers, as "leaves to hide the nakedness of the military government, and asked why the real ruler of Germany, Gen. Ludendorff, was not made chancellor."

HAS LIBEL SUIT, TOO.
Paris, June 28.—The libel suit of Dr. von Kuehlmann, the German foreign secretary against the Deutsche Zeitung of Berlin, concerning publication of articles relative to the secretary's conduct while in Bucharest in April, will be called next week, according to reports received from Switzerland and transmitted by the Havas agency. Many witnesses have been summoned by both sides, including the chauffeurs who drove the foreign secretary's automobile during night rides in Bucharest.

The Deutsche Zeitung, late in April, published an article asserting that Foreign Secretary von Kuehlmann and Count Csernini, the former Austrian foreign secretary, had acted in a manner which absented their countries during the negotiations at Bucharest. Secretary von Kuehlmann, it was said, was often seen with a well-known member of the underworld.

KAISER IS FURIOUS.
LONDON, June 27.—According to an Amsterdam dispatch to the Central News, the German emperor has sent the imperial chancellor, Count von Hertling, "a furious telegram" about Dr. von Kuehlmann's speech.

Dr. von Kuehlmann, replying to criticism during a council of yesterday, said: "Once legends have arisen, they are difficult to destroy, but I must declare, with a view to counter-attacking the growth of a legend, that there can be no question of my having bound myself to the idea of a long war."

The foregoing was evoked by a deputy who referred to "Dr. von Kuehlmann's expectation of a war of very long duration."

\$25,000 FINE FOR PROFITEER ON WAR FLOUR

New York, June 28.—Jacob Kulia, a wholesaler, charged with making excessive profits on the sale of large quantities of flour, was ordered by the federal food board here last night to contribute \$25,000 to the Red Cross or forfeit his license. The "fine," if paid, will be the largest contribution thus far to the Red Cross by a violator of the food regulations.

"BLUE DEVILS" WILL PAY VISIT TO HAMILTON

Ottawa, June 28.—On their way to New York, two officers and seven men of the "blue devils" will spend a few hours in Hamilton on July 2. They are due to arrive in Hamilton at 4:30 in the afternoon and to leave Hamilton for New York at 8:18 on the same day. The remaining officer and twenty men will proceed direct from Toronto to Toledo.

MANY GERMAN SOLDIERS CONTINUE TO DESERT

Paris, June 28.—Three barbed wire fences, one of which is charged with electricity, have proved ineffectual in hindering German soldiers from deserting across the frontier into Switzerland, says a Havas dispatch from Basle. The German military authorities have attempted to remedy the evil by cancelling all leaves of absence and special privileges for soldiers hailing from Alsace-Lorraine.

AMUNDSEN GOING NORTH

Christiania, June 28.—Raid Amundsen's ship Maud, in which the famous explorer will attempt to reach the north pole, left Christiania today for the north. Capt. Amundsen himself will board the vessel when she reaches Tromsø.

RUSSIAN 'RED' GOVT. HAS BEEN OUSTED; GRAND DUKE RULES

Revolt Spirit Spreading in Hun Armies; Two Mutinies
Bolshevik Ministry Are Reported Overthrown At Moscow By Gens. Kaledines and Korniloff and the Grand Duke Nicholas Proclaimed the New Emperor—Lenine and Trotzky Reported In Flight.

London, June 28.—Advices from Moscow assert that Grand Duke Nicholas has been proclaimed emperor. Nikolai Lenine, the premier, and Leon Trotzky, the minister of war, are said to have fled to the Murman coast. General Kaledines is said to have co-operated with General Korniloff in the capture of Moscow.

KERENSKY THE COMING MAN.
The Copenhagen newspapers, the agency dispatch adds, give prominence to a Berlin dispatch, quoting the Tages Zeitung of that city, as follows:
"It is believed here that the Bolshevik Government will soon be overthrown and that Kerensky is the man of the future in Russia."

LENINE REPORTED OVERTHROWN.
London, June 28.—According to unconfirmed reports today, the Bolshevik Government in Moscow has been overthrown, says a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Copenhagen. Moscow, the report said, has been captured by Gen. Korniloff, supported by German troops.

The advices declare that the supporters of Grand Duke Nicholas have overthrown the Soviets throughout the Siberian Provinces of Irkutsk, Blagovieshtchensk and Khabarovsk.

RED GUARDS SURRENDERED.
The defeat of the Bolsheviks is said to have been made possible by the victories of the Czech-Slovak forces and the treachery of the Red Guard. Several detachments of the Red Guard are declared to have murdered their officers and then surrendered.

The Exchange Telegraph Company publishes its message containing the reports of the Bolshevik overthrow and the accompanying details "with reserve," and points out that the information emanates mainly from German sources and therefore should be received with caution.

THE WAR SITUATION

There are yet no outward indications as to when and where the German command will launch its next stroke against the allied lines. The fighting will on the western front continue with only raids and local attacks, while on the eastern front the offensive across the Alsace and that on the Novon-Montdidier front has been sufficient to permit the Germans to prepare fully for a renewal of the offensive. Allied capital look for another enemy blow very soon. Military observers believe it will come on the front between Montdidier and Ypres.

Will Try Surprise.
For the past few days the German artillery fire has been violent on several sectors, each of which might be selected for an attack. These sectors are the south of Arras, the northern and southern legs of the Lys salient and south of the Alsace. The Germans may, however, attempt to surprise the Allies by attacking where they hope they will not be expected.

Aerial activity is above the average. The Germans have raided Paris two nights in succession. No great damage was caused Wednesday, and on Thursday slight material damage and several casualties resulted. Allied bombing squadrons are very active against German military targets behind the lines. The British are making nightly raids into Germany, especially against manufacturing and railroad towns between Metz and the Rhine.

Unsettled conditions in Austria-Hungary may keep the Austrians from immediately resuming the offensive in Italy. The food situation continues so serious that, reports from Switzerland say, martial law may be proclaimed throughout the dual monarchy.

Reports from Berlin through neutral countries denote increasing pan-German anger against the German foreign secretary, for his recent speech in the Reichstag.

EMMA DESTINN IS TOO PATRIOTIC FOR HUNS

Amsterdam, June 28.—Emma Destinn, the Bohemian opera singer has been banned from the stage in Prague on the ground that "she has placed her services entirely at the disposal of the Czech-Slovak agitation." She was to have appeared in opera at Prague during the period recently when bitter anti-Austrian demonstrations took place there. The police issued a special order forbidding her appearance.

NEWSPRINT WORKERS GET WAGE ADVANCE IN UNITED STATES

Washington, June 28.—Award of a general wage increase of 10 cents an hour for workers in the wood pulp and newsprint paper industry, with equal membership of eight unions. Eight hours is made a day for mill workers and nine hours for employees outdoors, with time and one-half for overtime. An arrangement is made for revision of the scales on January 1 and July 1 of each year in accordance with the rise or decline of commodity prices.

In its wage award, the labor board declared the new scale is based entirely on increased cost of living. It orders recognition of rights of workers to organize.
