Raise Jurors' Pay.

That the expenditures necessary for the construction of the Middlesex suburban area section of the provincial highway should be raised by debentures and not by direct taxation, was the opinion of County Engineer Charles Talbot, given when S. Oakes of Strathroy asked, at the meeting of the county council yesterday afternoon, how they money would be raised. He recommended that debentures be issued from time to time, at least for 20 years, and declared that if the money were raised by assessment the tax rate would textremely high.

The engineer said that it would be paid for wholly and solely by the county. Under present conditions each 'ownship is granted so much to spend on roads. 
