UNIONISTS HAVE **AGAIN AVOIDED** DEFINITE SPLIT

Consolidation of Party With Organization and Platform Is Shelved.

SAME OLD PLATFORM

That of Notorious 1917 Election To Do Duty in Com-

platform and organization, has been shelved until next spring, when the House meets again. The "party" will remain in the meantime in its present uncohesive form. The platform for the coming by-elections will be the platform of the notorious election of 1917. The organization will be the shattered remnants of that which was used on the same occasion.

Sir Robert's announcement as contained in the statement given out afterwards must have been a somewhat dreary affair. He dwelt long upon the platform of 1917, and declared that no government had ever implemented its pre-election promises as this Government had. (Loud cheers).

In General Terms.

He thereupon laid down in very general terms the policy of the Government for the future on the prominent issues of the day. He did not ask the gathering to pronounce upon these immediately; in fact the premier's health is not in a condition to permit him to endure controversial debate, and he was very tired after the ordeal which he was compelled to go through.

He informed his followers that the question of the permanency of the party would be postponed until next session, when members would have had an opportunity of digesting the puroposals submitted, and when a caucus would be held at which the whole matter would be threshed out. He put some comfort into the hearts of his followers in the meantime by declaring that under normal conditions there would be no general election until 1922, after the decennial census and redistribution or federal constituencies.




