ASK THAT ORDER BE ANNULLED HAS A CHANCE FOR RECOVERY

Trades and Labor Council At
Sarnia Objects To Presi-
dent's Ruling.

SARNIA, Nov. 24.—Stating that the order recently issued by D. E. Hanna, president of the Canadian National Railways, forbidding employees of the system to accept nominations as candidates for parliament, is a distinct blow to the political freedom of a vast body of Canadian workers, and going on record as opposing any such attempt to treat this body of workers as civil servants, when in reality they are corporation employees and entitled to the same civil rights as other railroad and corporation workers, the Sarnia Trades and Labor Council has adopted a resolution protesting against this action, which will be forwarded to Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress, Hon. Gideon Robertson, minister of labor, and the officers of Division No. 4, Railway Employees of America, urging that every possible step be taken to carry this grievance to President Hanna and make a decided stand for its annulment.

The resolution points out that it is a matter of record that certain employees have been dismissed after accepting a nomination, and that the Canadian National will in a short time be able to apply this order over what are now Grand Trunk employees, thus affecting many such workers in this city.

The resolution follows:

"We, the Sarnia Trades and Labor Council, wish to go on record as being opposed to any such attempt to treat this vast body of workers as civil servants, when in reality they are corporation employees, and are entitled to the same civil rights as other railroad and corporation employees. This is a distinct blow to the political freedom of a vast body of Canadian workers, and we deem this an opportune time to assert ourselves as organized workers."

City Manager Moore of Guelph
Shot in Mistake For
Bear.

GUELPH, Nov. 24.—Word was received in the city this morning that City Manager T. J. Moore, who left last week for a two weeks' hunting trip in the French River district had been shot at Bigwood, 60 miles east of Sudbury, by a man named Jones from Galt, who mistook him for a bear. The message stated that Mr. Moore had been taken to the Sudbury Hospital.

A later wire to Mrs. Moore said that Mr. Moore was very weak, but doing as well as could be expected, and that the bullet had followed a rib from the back to his chest. The city manager and Magistrate Watt were together on the hunting trip.

Moore was attired in a blue coat, dark trousers and a red cap, and was hiding in a crouching position in a clump of thick bushes, apparently waiting for a deer, when Jones, who was not in the Guelph party, came upon him. Mistaking Mr. Moore for a bear, Jones fired from a distance of 40 or 50 feet. Jones' rifle was a 30-30 Winchester, and the bullet was soft-nosed. The doctors were able to state today that the bullet did not pierce the lung, heart or stomach, and an X-ray examination shows that no part of the bullet remains within. There is a chance for recovery.

ONTARIO TO TRY PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION

Committee Favors Gradual
Adoption of Plan in
Province.

TO EXPERIMENT FIRST
Brant, Waterloo and Oxford
Counties To Try Scheme
At First.

TORONTO, Nov. 24.—Gradual adoption of proportional representation in the province of Ontario with preliminary experiments in Hamilton and Ottawa and one rural section of Western Ontario and one in Eastern Ontario is recommended by the sub-committee of the proportional representation committee appointed by the Legislature to report on the question. The sub-committee, which met in the Parliament Buildings here today, recommended an increase of seats in the Legislature from 111 to 115, in order to try the experiment.

The sub-committee is comprised of the following members of the Provincial Parliament: H. P. Hill, West Ottawa, chairman; Hon. G. S. Henry, East York; Rev. Edgar Watson, North York; D. E. Russell, and K. K. Homuth, South Waterloo.

The recommendations follow:
1. That the membership of the Legislative Assembly be increased by the addition of four members.
2. That Ottawa and Hamilton be each allowed three members, to be elected by the cities as a whole under the single transferable vote system of proportional representation.

3. That the present constituencies of Carleton, North and South Lanark, Leeds, Grenville and Brockville together elect seven members under the single transferable vote system of proportional representation.

4. That the constituencies of North and South Brant, North and South Waterloo and North and South Oxford together elect seven members under the single transferable vote system of proportional representation.

5. That the rest of the province select their members in what is known as single-member constituencies, but that the transferable vote be used in the election of such members.
6. That municipalities be permitted to elect their councils by means of the single transferable vote system of proportional representation.
7. That legislation be forthwith introduced into effect the above recommendations.

Investigation May Be Made
Shortly Into Sales At
Chatham.

CHATHAM, Nov. 24.—An investigation may be made shortly into the alleged indiscriminate issuance of liquor prescriptions by Chatham physicians, according to a statement made by the police magistrate to The Advertiser this afternoon. The magistrate stated that the records of local drug stores had been recently examined, and that it was found in one or two instances that certain physicians have issued a great many prescriptions over the normal average.

A rumor has been current that certain high medical authorities in Toronto may take steps to curtail the issuance of prescription forms to certain local physicians, but inquiry in this city late this afternoon failed to verify this rumor.

An Exciting Battle.

Evidences of an exciting battle between runners and illicit dealers in "booze" have just been unearthed by Chief Peters of the Kent County police. The evidence consists of three Studebaker high-powered cars, with the tops riddled with bullets, with windshields smashed, sides grooved with shot, the lights, front and rear, smashed by bullets and the cars in general in a bad shape as the result of a stiff fight.

It is believed by the authorities that these cars may have been used by a party of runners in their fight at the farm of the Frank King, Dover Township, on the night of Oct. 30, when Frank Cornish of Windsor received severe wounds in both legs in a skirmish with alleged liquor dealers. It has also been officially stated that shotguns, rifles, revolvers and automatics figured in the fight.

Alleged Frame-Up.

Members of the gang of alleged runners were interviewed by Chief Peters in Windsor yesterday, and most of them stated to Peters that they believed they were the victims of a frame-up on the part of the Dover farmers. One of these men, according to a statement of Chief Peters, exhibited a cap which he claimed was shot off his head during the fight, and other members of the gang displayed birdshot which they claimed they had picked from their clothes.

It is thought that these men may be required to testify at the secondary hearing of the case, which will be held in this city on Tuesday, November 20, when the four Kings, Frank, Eugene, Andrew and Alfred E. together with Peter Goodreau, may stand trial for shooting Frank Cornish "with intent to kill and rob."

ASK SHORTER HOURS
RATHER THAN CUT

Employees of G. T. R. Shops
At Stratford Negotiating
At Montreal.

STRATFORD, Nov. 24.—Orders from Montreal to reduce the staff of the G. T. R. shops by 20 per cent were received by Master Mechanic J. C. Garden today. It was not known today on what basis the reduction would be made. The men are urging that working hours be cut rather than that the men be laid off. Mr. Garden is in Montreal for a conference on the situation.

BELIEVE MAN WANTED
IN WINNIPEG CROSSED
BORDER AT WINDSOR

WINNIPEG, Nov. 24.—According to an evening paper, Jim Buller, the alleged runner in the crime of the liquor detectives at St. Boniface, has gone to the United States. It is asserted that police officials have learned that he went by automobile to Duguid, a little town near Winnipeg, and that the next morning to the crime the other man in the case came through on a train with tickets for Windsor, Ontario. The men are supposed to have met at Duguid, gone to Windsor and got across to the other side there.

GAVE HALF BILLION

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—John D. Rockefeller has given away nearly half a billion dollars, his son, John D. Rockefeller, declared here tonight in what is believed to be the first authentic detailed statement that has ever been made concerning his father's philanthropic gifts. The approximate total of the gifts is \$475,000,000, nearly half of which has been distributed in the last five years.

The statement refers to testimony given by the younger Mr. Rockefeller before the industrial relations committee here January 25, 1915. At that time, he said, he believed his father's gifts would total a quarter of a billion dollars, although so far as he knew, there was no accurate record of the oil king's philanthropy up to that time.

LUMBERMAN KILLED.

NORTH BAY, Nov. 24.—Andrew Martin, aged 69, of the Cochrane Lumber Company, was accidentally killed near here yesterday while on a hunting trip. He, along with a companion, was walking downhill, when the butt of his gun struck an obstruction, the charge going through his body. He died soon afterwards. The remains were brought to North Bay this morning, and will be taken to Cache Bay for burial.

MAY HAVE ROBBED DRUG STORE ALSO

Pair Under Arrest At Guelph
Suspected of Hamilton
Job.

GUELPH, Nov. 24.—Through a letter received by Chief Rae from the Hamilton police today it was learned that Fred Terberry and George Oram, the young men arrested in connection with the recent burglaries here, have police records. The Hamilton officials also notified the chief that a drug store robbery occurred in Hamilton Friday night, and they are of the opinion that the men now in custody here may know something of the affair. When searched following the arrest Terberry had some drugs in his possession other than those taken from the local doctor's office, and these will be sent to Hamilton for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not they were taken from the drug store there.

DENIES THE STATEMENT.

TORONTO, Nov. 24.—The attorney-general today issued a statement denying that the arrangements where Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin is to be put on trial for the killing of Beverly Trumble was arrived at after consultation with Attorney-General Haney, Crown Attorney Rodd and Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin.

"The only other person present at the consultation between Crown Attorney Rodd and myself," he said, "was his deputy, Mr. Edward Bayly, K.C."

FORD PAYS WORKERS \$7,000,000 IN BONUS CHECKS IN JANUARY

DETROIT, Nov. 24.—Bonus checks aggregating more than \$7,000,000 for employees of the Ford Motor Car Company are now being written, and their distribution will start January 1 next, 1920.

according to announcement this morning by E. B. Ford, president of the Ford Motor Company.

Mr. Ford also announced a forthcoming extra 3 per cent for the six months ending December 31 on Ford investment certificates held by employees of the company. This, Mr. Ford said, is in addition to the guaranteed 6 per cent. He added that 8 per cent had been paid July 31 last, making a total of 14 per cent on the certificates for 1920.
