BURGLARS MAKE \$1,000 HAUL

Get Away With Jewelry While South Londoners Are At Theatre.

Burglars, who pried open a rear window in the residence of Alfred Fraser, 191 Elmwood avenue, Monday night, during the absence of the family at a theatre, secured as booty diamond and other jewelry, probably exceeding \$1,000 in value.

Gaining an entrance through the window, the lock of which appears to have been too light or insecure, and readily yielded, the intruders pulled down all the blinds and turned on all the lights in the house, leading the neighbors to suppose that the occupants of the residence were at home. The house had been thoroughly ransacked, but only jewelry boxes appeared to have been pillaged, and other small and valuable articles taken.

Mr. Fraser stated to The Advertiser that he went to the theatre about 7 o'clock, and discovered that his house had been burglarized when he returned about 9:45. Late last night he could not state just how great his loss was, as there had not been time to check up all the articles that were probably missing. The burglars apparently having gone carefully and systematically through the house, selected what they wanted and then thrown everything else about in corners and under the bed.

Among the more valuable pieces of jewelry missing were a diamond ring and a diamond brooch, the ring alone being valued at upwards of \$600.

The police were notified, but late this afternoon had no clue as to the prize, the only arrests made last night being for disorderly conduct or drunkenness.

DIFFERENCES DATING BACK TO CIVIL WAR AT LAST SWEPT ASIDE

Talequah, Okla., Feb. 1.—Tribal differences dating back to the civil war when the powerful Cheekie Indian nation broke into three factions over the question of slavery, were wiped out here yesterday when several hundred delegates met and unanimously elected Levi Curtis of Muskogee, full-blooded principal chief. Levi Cookson, a mixed-blood, living near Gore, Okla., was chosen assistant chief.

For the first time in the history of the United States, white men, members through intermarriage, sat at the council and voted. Many of them were unable to speak Cherokee, and the proceedings frequently were halted while translations were made. When the solemn came 60 years ago, older members recalled yesterday, a majority of the Cherokees voted in favor of joining the Confederate forces. The others, a band of no mean proportions, cast their lot with the Federal troops then operating in Kansas.

DEPUTATION WILL ASK COUNCIL TO HELP UNEMPLOYED

Social Service Organization Names Committee To Appear Before Civic Body.

The problem of unemployment in the city was seriously discussed at the annual meeting of the London Social Service Council held on Monday evening in the Y. M. C. A. E. A. Pocock and Harry Wray, president of the council, reported about 1,400 breadwinners out of employment. James Gray, the president of the Social Service Council, Rev. D. C. MacGregor, Rev. J. G. Stuart and other members mentioned the fact that during the course of a week many out of work, come and ask assistance in some manner or other. In the discussion it was found that there was no organization to which a man seeking a meal or bed could be referred. The council as a whole lamented the conditions of unemployment in the city, and appointed a deputation composed of those following to wait on the city council, and ask that by some means or other, work be opened up for the men or the federal system suggested. Rev. D. C. MacGregor, Rev. R. G. Peever, James Gray, W. E. Kelly, Miss B. Smith, and Rev. T. D. McCullough.

Pitiable Tales. Rev. R. G. Peever said that he had heard from teachers of the pitiable tales of woe that came to the teachers' ears from undernourished little children whose fathers are out of work. Several of the members spoke of the out of work as being slow to accept charity; in every case they asked for work and shunned charity, but because of a wife and children they were obliged to accept it. During the war it was reported that none solicited help, and this proved that if there were work these citizens who have asked for help would not have done so.

A small committee was also appointed to look into the matter of allowing representatives from the labor representation committee on the social service council. It was pointed out by the president that no organization that had political affiliations was represented.

An Excellent Report. An excellent report of the year's activities was given by the secretary, Rev. T. D. McCullough. "The Social Service Council has made a name for itself in the community," he said, "and its members' allowance act, not to mention all the other work done," said President Gray, following the report. The report showed that the council had been the means of establishing the three day school, the swimming pool, though only receiving half of the amount of money allotted for this purpose. The president stated that the council had been assured of receiving the whole amount this year.

The report also mentioned the allowances in this district was very good. Over 115 applications had been made for the allowance, and more than 50 per cent of the applicants were already receiving it. The secretary reported that through investigation into the cases of the mothers' allowance commission was endeavoring to make some amendments made to the act, as providing for the deserted mother in certain instances and providing for a child until it is 18 years of age. Peter Bryce, in reference to the act, said recently that he was confident that the work of the council on the continent, when amended.

Movie Investigation. The council's pictures also reported progress. The survey, the secretary announced, would also be completed shortly, the religious census having held it up for some time. The success of the past year was due, Mr. McCullough said, to the work of the 80 voluntary workers. Every undertaking throughout the year had been accomplished.

The officers elected for the year were: Dean L. N. Tucker, honorary president; James Gray, president; Rev. R. G. Peever, first vice-president; Miss G. Smith, second vice-president; T. D. McCullough, secretary; and J. MacGregor, treasurer. A vote of thanks was tendered to the members of the council for their work during the year.

Mr. McCullough, in reply, said that he would move the motion that one for the council, social service was only on the eve of the great things which would be done before long.

QUASHES CONVICTION OF FIVE SOCIALISTS

U. S. Supreme Court Reverses Decision—Debs Must Stay in Prison.

Washington, Jan. 31.—Conviction of Victor L. Berger and four other members of the Socialist party for violation of the espionage act was reversed today by the United States supreme court on the ground that Judge Landis should not have heard the suit after his eligibility had been taken.

Those convicted, with Berger in the federal court at Chicago were Adolph Guerner, national secretary of the party, William F. Krus, editor of the Young Socialists' Magazine, J. Louis Engdahl, and Irwin St. John. Berger and the other four were convicted under the section prohibiting attempts to cause insubordination and disloyalty in the United States naval and military forces, and sentences ranging from 10 to 20 years were imposed.

The appeal was brought to the supreme court on the ground that Judge Knessey Mountain Landis, who presided at the trial, had shown "personal bias and prejudice" against the defendants because of their nationality.

DISCUSSION IS BLOCKED. Washington, Feb. 1.—Consideration of a resolution to investigate the newspaper market and prices was blocked in the Senate by Senator Penrose yesterday. Senator Penrose moved that the resolution be referred to the committee on printing and the motion was adopted.

QUITE CONTENT AS A UNIONIST

January indicated that the wish of the electorate was that only a central school should be built this year.

Another matter that promises to raise the dust at today's meeting of the board will be the suggestion of the committee that outside architects be asked to prepare plans and estimates for the new buildings. Strong opposition is promised to this proposition on the grounds that not only has the board its own paid architect, but that the money in paying outside architects from two to five per cent in commissions on the total cost of the buildings, a cost which must necessarily increase the annual amount to be paid by the citizens.

Dublin, Feb. 1.—Daniel Healy, one of the four men tried by a court-martial for the shooting of one of the fourteen officers killed in this city, November 21, was acquitted and discharged last night. The other three, Frank Teeling, William Conway and Edward Potter, were acquitted of manslaughter yesterday, but the court reserved judgment on the alternative charge of murder.

City Briefs

MILKMEN TO FEAST. The annual banquet of the Ontario Milk Producers' Association will be held in Toronto this evening at the Hotel Macdonald.

FIRE IN A GARAGE. The fire department was called to a garage on Dundas street, where an automobile was on fire. The blaze was extinguished before it could spread and only the one car was damaged.

P. U. C. WELL. The well being sunk by the waterworks department of the P. U. C. on Dundas street near the inter-switch, Eleanor street has reached a depth of 95 feet. It is expected to strike water at the 165 foot level.

TO BE TRIED BY JUDGE. Percy Bridge appeared before Judge Talbot Macbeth this morning on a charge of theft, and elected to be tried on Thursday morning. Yesterday he appeared before Judge W. H. Ritchie and elected to be tried by judge without jury. The article claimed to have been stolen was a motor cycle.

WILL SPEAK IN HAMILTON. G. W. Bay, sales manager of the London P. U. C. Hydro Shop will address a conference of electricians and manufacturers and agents which will be held in Hamilton next week. Mr. Bay's address is slated for Wednesday, February 3.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE NAMED. President George Reid of the United Welfare Fund association has appointed the following committee to nominate officers for the ensuing year: A. T. Leslie, P. Skene, W. H. Ritchie, Lieut.-Col. C. Brown, Adjutant P. Martin, and W. F. D. Jarvis. The committee will meet on Wednesday at 4:30 o'clock.

M. A. B. MEETING ADJOURNED. The Mothers' Allowance Board, which was to have met on Tuesday afternoon to fix a basis for the new rate of allowance to mothers, has been postponed until Friday, because of illness among the members. At Friday's meeting it was probably determined whether a fair allowance for mothers receiving the grant, based on the cost of living in this city, should be fixed.

OBJECTION CAUSES TROUBLE. One bottle of whiskey received in three men being brought into police court this morning on charges of having liquor in a place other than a private dwelling. The trio, who had been to a party on Pearl street, denied having the liquor. Two were dismissed, but the other was locked up until Thursday, when Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon will give his decision. Judgment was reserved at the request of G. N. Weekes, counsel for Pearson.

ATTENDING FORMAL OPENING. The officers' council in connection with the formal opening of the Stratford division of the Salvation Army will be attended today by Brigadier Alex. Crichton, local commander, and Col. John Rawlings, chief secretary for the army in Eastern Canada and former commander of this district. About two weeks ago the local officers received word that the division of London was the headquarters would be divided and that Stratford would be the divisional office of the new district.

LOAN MEN TO MOVE EVIDENCE. Several Londoners likely will be requested to give evidence before the royal commission investigating the hydro-electric system at Toronto next week. City Clerk Baker, City Treasurer James S. Bell and other officials may be called, as well as Dr. R. W. Shaw, who was formerly a member of the committee here. It is not known on what particular points the Londoners will be asked to give evidence, nor have they received official notice to attend.

SERVICE OF SUMMONS SET ASIDE. An order setting aside the attempted service of a writ of summons against the trades and labor council, in the action of T. B. Tozer against the city of London for damages for alleged wrongful dismissal from the fire department, was made by Judge Talbot Macbeth yesterday. The council had made a party to the action. The plaintiff attempted to have G. F. McKay served as an agent of the council. The costs of the action are to be paid forthwith after taxation by the plaintiff to the applicants. Judge Macbeth pointed out that he took the case of the Metcalfe Roofing Company, of London, as a precedent.

J. H. Donohue appeared for the council and J. M. McEvoy for Tozer.

POISON PEN DOOM SEEN IN DISCOVERY BY A FRENCHMAN

Anonymous Letter Writers Will Be Unable To Disguise Their Work.

FAKES ARE REVEALED
Mathematical Diagrams Correlate Up and Down Strokes Perfectly.

PARIS, Jan. 31.—The day of the anonymous letter writer, who vilifies his political enemies with pen and ink, and you'll be almost sure to solve the problem.

The laboratory work of Dr. Dayles in Paris along the lines of pure comparison is meeting with great success. Only a fortnight ago the Paris police photographed the imprint left on a dusty jewelry case by a part of the left forearm of a burglar. Without any other evidence than a suspicious record and the peculiar position of the bones the police were able to force a confession from the suspect, who admitted that his "business" was no longer reasonably safe and assured the detectives he would like a more honorable life when his sentence ended. As evidence of good faith he returned all the stolen jewels.

Of course such research work is beneficial to the police, but one Paris newspaper suggests that there is no longer any need for Sherlock Holmes and other supernatural detectives now that Dr. Locard Bayles and Bertillon have succeeded in registering crime indications in every conceivable fashion.

QUARANTINE ON CORN IN FORCE FOR SIX WEEKS
Order Was Effective on December 17, 1920, Says R. A. Finn.

Although a dispatch emanating from Ottawa this morning announced that official notification of a quarantine on corn fodder and products except shelled corn, grown in the seven counties of Southwestern Ontario, affected by the European corn borer, was issued on Friday, R. A. Finn, the local representative of agriculture, said today that such a quarantine has been in effect since December 17 of last year.

On December 17, he received, he claimed, official notification from the Ottawa corn borer committee that an order had been put into force. By farmers or dealers were prohibited from shipping corn fodder or shelled corn on the cob or corn cobs from certain townships in Kent, from Middlesex, Elgin, Oxford, Huron or Oxford to a great degree, for farmers in these counties grow corn chiefly for their own use, and did have some effect on Elgin and Kent, because considerable corn was exported annually from the two counties.
