**Friend of Dumb Animals.**—Death of George Angell, Who Performed Noble Work.

BOSTON, March 16.—George Thorndike Angell, "the friend of dumb animals," as the veteran leader in the humane educational movement in the United States was called, died early to-day, aged 86 years.

In 1866, after seeing two horses run to death in a race, he became interested in humane work for dumb animals, and prompted by the action of Henry Bergh, who in that year started the New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, Mr. Angell established the publication Our Dumb Animals.

He traveled many times throughout the United States and in scores of other countries in pursuance of that work and caused to be established more than seventy thousand "bands of mercy" in America and England.

## "A PITCH OF FRENZY AND OF MISBEHAVIOR"

Bishop Du Moulin Makes a Scathing Allusion to Demonstrations of British Suffragettes.

Bishop DuMoulin in a discourse upon "The Broken Home" at St. James' Cathedral mid-day service yesterday arraigned the British suffragettes in scathing terms. He declared the conduct to be an awful and scandalous consummation of the tendency of women to leave the home for politics. "A pitch of frenzy, insanity and public misbehavior impossible for language to describe."

Preaching from the parable of the Prodigal Son, he said, there were two ways in which the home could be broken up. There was the inevitable departure of sons for college or business, and of the daughters to become brides. War was a terrible despoiler of that centre of joy and peace, the home.

There was also the breaking up of the home thru the inroads of selfishness and deception as typified by Jacob.

In the Christian home the woman reigneth enthroned, the sceptre of love. That was her true position. She was the queen, the mistress of the home. When the wife said to the husband and sons, "Don't come home to-day, we are going to have a bridge, and the house will be full of women," the father and sons are driven to the club and may never again have the same attachment for their home.

One of the most awful foes of the home was the practice of divorce. It was something terrible to contemplate in the states. In one of the states it was said that one out of three marriages ended in a divorce. Cell-granted 12 divorces in one hour, a rate of one per five minutes. Such a condition meant a blight and curse on the community.

There was also the dreadful, damnable invention of race suicide, the fruit of the heathen superstition of the direction of destroying the respect for femininity. Girls and women seeking to descend from their queenly position in the home to the position of a wage slave in the factory or the wish to mingle with men in parliament until two or three in the morning? If so what was to become of the home?

It was a Christian duty to resist the incursion of this spirit which would ruin the home and destroy the sentiment of that noble couplet: Home, sweet home. There is no place like home.

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## WOMAN SUBORNED PERJURY

Mrs. Catharine Quinn Convicted on a Serious Charge.

Mrs. Catharine Quinn was yesterday found guilty in the sessions of suborning perjury. When the verdict was announced she collapsed and her screams could be heard thru the city hall.

In the high court last August Mrs. Quinn got judgment in a damage suit against the city, when Mabel Catts was her star witness, but she was afterwards sent to the Mercer for six months for committing perjury.

In the witness box Mabel declared yesterday the evidence she gave in the high court was false and due to Mr. Quinn's intimidation.

Annie Quinn, her 15-year-old daughter, testified that she had made certain statements to detectives because she had been frightened.

Testifying herself, Mrs. Quinn admitted committing perjury, but not suborning.

When asked by Crown Attorney Drayton if she had ever beaten Mabel, Mrs. Quinn replied she had not.

"I think I shoved her on the lounge, but she had kicked my boy and paralyzed him for two hours. Well, now, mister, your own common sense should tell you what it means when a woman kicks a man. She wanted my boy to marry her. He is only a year old, and I have to dress him. When I saw my boy fall I was ill for a week afterwards."

"I'll stick to my children till I die, mister; they're flesh of my flesh and blood of my honest blood. My house is so quiet that they say it is like death," and Mrs. Quinn wept certain tears from her eyes with her handkerchief, and she added, "I am 45 years old, and I was never drunk in my life. I don't think I'm many more in my family who deal by their children as I do by mine."

Asked what Lawyer McGregor told her about the witnesses, she said: "He said: 'Get the witnesses together and see that they all swear the same thing.' He said to get all I could to condemn the sidewalk. That's all."

**Unvaccinated Children Sent Home.**—MONTREAL, March 16.—Twenty per cent. of the school children here were refused admission to the public schools this morning owing to their not being vaccinated. There is a great prevalence of smallpox at present.
