### CONVENTION OPEN TO PUBLIC.

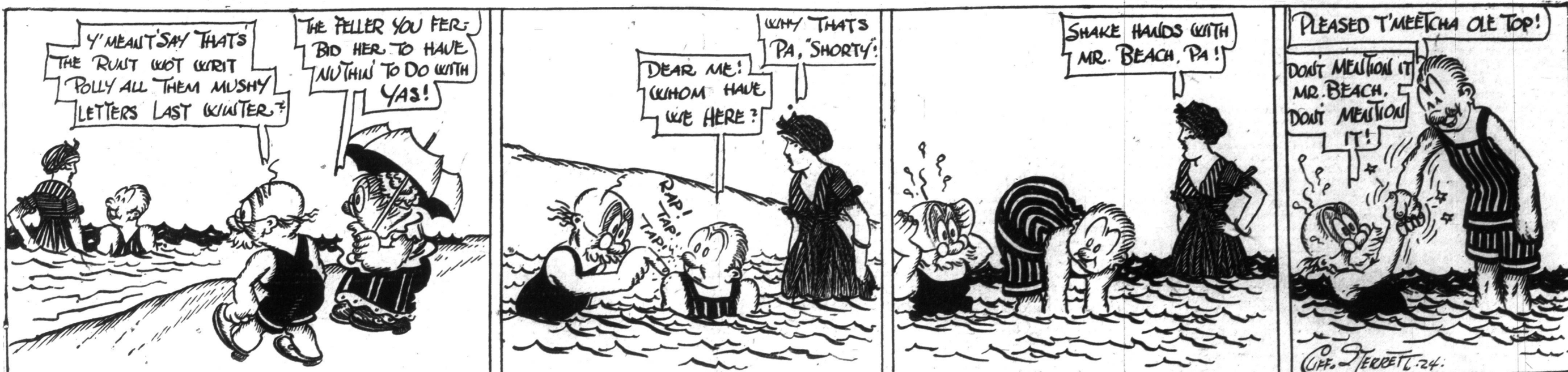
