A wire has been received at Ottawa that the Ross rifle factory at Quebec, following the cancellation of its two million dollar order by the government. has closed down. It is understood that the British Government has also served notice that it will not accept delivery of rifles after the end of this month, so the Ross company has apparently decided to cease operations. It is understood that the government will take steps immediately to expropriate the factory. An order will likely be passed taking the necessary authority this week. The government has already, under the War Measures so as to cover a case such as this, so here will be no technical legal diffi-

culties in the way. It is also understood that the complete specifications for the new British Enfield rifle, which will also be made the Canadian service arm, have been eceived, and it is presumed steps will be taken to manufacture as soon as possible this new rifle when the Ross factory is expropriated.
