### SOCIAL SERVICE BRANCH WILL OPEN

Many Applicants for Import-ant Department of Toronto University.

The formal opening of the session of the department of social service in connection with Toronto University will take place in Convocation Hall at 3 o'clock on Friday afternoon. The department was founded in 1914. Its lines were well and wisely laid under the direction of Professor MacIver and Miss MacGregor, so that its students could get some grasp of fundamental principles, as well as experience in the practical working of social agencies in the city. It has grown as its possibilities were more and more realized, till it has become necessary to appoint a director to give it full time service. The new director is Professor J. A. Dale, recently appointed to the chair of social science in the university. He has been for the past 12 years professor of education in McGill University, and for the six years preceding was an extension lecturer for the University of Oxford. He is widely familiar with educational and social work in various countries, and has a broad background of training. His appointment makes it possible for the university to give a full two-year course, the best time in which students of good previous education can hope to cover the ground and make themselves efficient. He will have the assistance of the excellent staff provided by the city; and the field work will still be in charge of Miss MacGregor.

### APPOINT COUZENS RAILWAY MANAGER

Consulting Board Also Selected for Co-ordinating of Interests.

As forecasted in The World last week, H. H. Couzens, general manager of the Toronto Hydro-Electric system, has been appointed by the Toronto Transportation Commission manager of the Toronto street car system. The commission will not get possession of either the city or the T. S. R. lines until September of next year, but in the meantime Mr. Couzens will be busy with preparations to improve the service when it is taken over. Mr. E. M. Ashworth, acting secretary of the Transportation Commission, gave out the following statement yesterday: "At a meeting of the Toronto Transportation Commission held at noon in the board room of the Toronto Electric Commissioners, Mr. H. H. Couzens was appointed general manager. The commission also appointed Messrs. R. C. Harris, commissioner of works of the city of Toronto; E. L. Cousins, general manager of the Harbor Commission; and F. A. Gaby, chief engineer of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, in a consulting capacity, with a view to co-ordinating the interests which they represent and obtaining the benefit of their advice on the problems with which they are familiar."

Chairman Ellis of the commission announced that they would shortly acquire offices of their own. Up to the present the commission has been using

the offices of the Hydro Commission on Yonge street.

It is understood the commission has already considered the question of harmonizing the gauge of the Toronto and city lines and cars with those of the radials which are of standard gauge, but Mr. Ellis would make no statement in this connection. The gauge of the Toronto lines is 4 feet 10½ inches, while standard gauge is 4 feet 8½ inches.

With city and suburban lines of the same gauge radial cars would be able to enter the city with produce at night when passenger traffic is light, and this, it is said, would be a considerable source of revenue. The commission is also confronted with the necessity of widening the devil strip of the Toronto lines before the big cars on the city lines can be run down to the business district.

Mr. E. M. Ashworth, assistant manager of the Toronto Hydro system, it is understood, will succeed Mr. Couzens as manager.

### URGE DEPARTMENT FOR VOCATIONAL GUIDANCE

Trustee McClelland proposes the establishment by the Toronto board of education of a department for vocational guidance. The project will be before the meeting of the school management committee this afternoon.

Mrs. A. C. Courtice's motion, for the establishment of an opportunity school, at which children and adults may supplement their education along any line will also be up for consideration.

### PLANS FOR BRANCH INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL

Building for Eastern District is Urgently Required, Principal Says.

Plans for the new branch technical industrial high school for the eastern district were placed before the advisory committee of the board of education yesterday afternoon. Principal A. C. McKay stated that it was urgently required. The site, north of Danforth on the west side of Greenwood avenue, had been lying idle since it was acquired by the board of education several years ago. Although out of the estimates by the board of control this year, Mr. Cowley believed it would be passed next year, as the demand had become too incessant to be longer delayed.

The plans call for a \$200,000 building, half of the cost to be granted by the Ontario government. The committee made the following appointments: Miss Lillian M. Black, B.A., assistant teacher of physical culture and general subjects, with an initial annual salary of \$1,800. George Addison Hanes, assistant teacher (industrial)
