Strong Ticket In Charlotte

Opposition Convention Held Yesterday — Hon. J. P. Burchill Will Run in Northumberland—Former Government Candidate Joins Opposition Forces

At a gathering of more than 800 electors from all parts of Charlotte county in St. Stephen yesterday, candidates were chosen for the opposition party in the coming elections. The candidates selected were W. F. Todd, H. R. Lawrence, Burton Hill and Joseph Gasik, forming an exceptionally strong ticket, which has the enthusiastic support of the entire opposition. The convention adopted resolutions voicing hearty accord with the principles for which the empire is at war; sympathy with Hon. George J. Clarke in his illness, confidence in W. E. Foster, the opposition leader, and pledging him their hearty support.

Hon. J. P. Burchill, one of the foremost residents of Northumberland county, has consented to run on the opposition ticket in place of David G. Schofield, who has found it necessary to retire from the fight. Although Mr. Schofield's retirement is regretted, there is much ground for satisfaction in Mr. Burchill's consent to accept the nomination.

In St. John County. W. E. Foster, leader of the opposition, and A. F. Bentley, his associate on the St. John county opposition ticket, addressed a large and enthusiastic meeting in Dipper Harbor last evening, setting forth the issues of the campaign in convincing style. One of the significant features of the meeting was the fact that W. J. Dean, formerly one of the strongest supporters of the government in the county, presided at the meeting and frankly explained why he no longer could support the government. J. P. Mosher, who was a member of the government ticket in 1908, also spoke and gave his reasons for leaving that party. Mr. Mosher, who at one time ran on the government ticket, was loudly applauded when he explained how he was disgusted with their methods, their corruption and graft, which forbade him in conscience to continue to support them. Mr. Foster, Mr. Bentley and Mr. Mosher will speak tonight at Glenn Falls in the Manor House. On Saturday night the opposition speakers will appear before the electors of Lorneville.
