



opening remarks His Worship stated that it gave him great pleasure to be present on such an occasion. He had cccasion, he remarked, to appear before the electors of Carleton four times and never once had they failed him.

The outer structure is of red brick with freestone trimmings and presents a pleasing appearance. In the main auditorium there are six large lights of 600 candlepower.
