

Prizes Announced In Junior Red Cross Contests In N. B.

May News Letter Just to Hand Carries Names of Successful Ones—List of Portfolios—Two New Branches Are Formed in Province

ANNOUNCEMENT of the winners in the provincial Junior Red Cross contests is made in the May News Letter just issued. The "Moonbeams" of Pembroke, Carleton County, were awarded first prize in the health rhyme contest, the only prize awarded in this competition.

In the poster competition no first prize was awarded, the second prize was won by "Sunshine Workers," grade 3 pupils, of Kothessy, and the third prize was won by the "Live Wires" grades 3 and 4 pupils of Hampton.

For the essay only a third prize was awarded and that was won by the "Utopians" of Utopia. For the Health Alphabet first prize, went to the "Sturdy Oaks," of Oak Point, and no second and third prizes were awarded.

The first verse of the winning health rhyme, which is to be sung to the tune of "Good Night Ladies" is as follows:

Red Cross Juniors! Red Cross Juniors! Red Cross Juniors! Of Canada, good and true, All the rules we will obey, Clean our teeth every day, Do our work before we play—Red Cross Juniors true!

WHAT LETTER CONTAINS. The News Letter contains the report of Miss Jessie L. Lawson, provincial Red Cross supervisor, of the annual meeting of the Junior superintendents at which Mr. Kittredge and Miss Olmstead, representatives of Red Cross Societies in Paris were speakers. Miss Olmstead had told of how greatly a few worn scrap books were appreciated by the Junior Red Cross children she visited in Esthonia and Miss Olmstead is asking the New Brunswick Juniors if they would not like to send scrap books to those fellow members in the distant European country, now that scrap books are not wanted for the Saint John post nursery.

The French page and a page of rhymes for little Juniors are included in the News Letter and instructions about annual reports. The list of portfolios sent in by New Brunswick Juniors in April is given as follows:

"Red Cross Servers," Andover, a very good one, for Spain. The Chatham Juniors, Grades I to VI, a very good one, for Australia. New Albert Juniors, Saint John, Grades I to VIII, a beautiful one in three volumes, in reply to one received from Fretz, Romania. "Loyalists Club," Moncton, a very nice one, for England. "Maple View branch, an interesting one, for Australia. "Lantnam Helpers," Middle Sack-

ville, Grades III and IV, an exceptionally lovely one, for England. Two portfolios have been received at the provincial Junior Red Cross office recently. One from San Francisco Grammar School which is exceptionally comprehensive and well arranged and is profusely illustrated to be sent to the Tobique Narrows branch in return for one sent by that branch last year.

The second portfolio from Ikadachi school, Shiga Gun, Shiga Ken, Japan, consists almost entirely of very fine original crayon drawings or water color paintings by the Japanese children and some very pretty colored pictures of Japanese scenes. A translation of the writing in this portfolio has been provided by a Japanese girl who is studying in Toronto.

There were two new Junior Red Cross branches formed in New Brunswick in April, 1, "Kew Juniors," Kinross Settlement, Westmorland County, and 2, (name not chosen yet), Ed River Lake, York County.

The total amount contributed during the month to the children's fund was \$44.66. The Red Cross Junior for May has also just been published and as its first article it has "The Story of the House," which is indeed a fascinating story and is especially interesting to the Junior Red Cross children as it is written and illustrated by William MacIntosh, M. Sc., of Saint John, N. B. The May number also contains a splendid Empire Day playlet that can be used in any schoolroom without special scenery which was specially written for the Red Cross Junior by Mrs. Margaret Lawrence of Saint John and will appeal to all Empire children.

There are a number of other very interesting articles in the May number and it has for its back cover a special message from the Duchess of Atholl with her signature and her photograph, her particular gifts to the Red Cross Juniors of Canada for whom she has so great an admiration.
