

ASSIGNMENTS DROP AGAIN IN DOMINION

Liabilities Also Decrease; July
Failures Total 131, is
Report.

OTTAWA, Oct. 30.—Another decline in the number of assignments under the Bankruptcy and Wind Up Acts is shown for the month of July, according to official figures made public today.

Liabilities of the assignors also show a notable decrease. Commercial failures in the Dominion in July totalled 181, as compared with 145 in June and 155 in July last year.

The cumulative total of failures for the first seven months of this year was 1,223, as against 1,485, 2,145 and 2,195 in the corresponding periods of 1924, 1923 and 1922, respectively.

July, 1925, showing a substantially lower number of failures than 1924 and a reduction of over 40 per cent from the two previous years. Cumulative figures on defaulted liabilities also showed a considerable improvement, the total for the first seven months of this year being \$17,998,000 as compared with \$31,777,000, \$37,923,000 and \$37,962,000, respectively, in the corresponding periods of the three previous years.

Of the 131 failures in July this year Ontario led with 52 with \$576,876 estimated total assets and \$855,972 estimated liabilities. Quebec next with 50 failures with \$537,594 and \$860,970, Alberta 11 with \$62,474 and \$123,190, New Brunswick five with \$15,210 and \$57,422, Nova Scotia four with \$13,925 and \$15,060, British Columbia four with \$21,896 and \$36,583.
