The Value of Charcoal

Commission from Musquash, occurred yesterday afternoon at five o'clock at Epworth Park, when Gregory Hammond, fifteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Hammond, of West St. John, was electrocuted, dying instantly. He picked up a primary wire, which had been blown down by the heavy wind.

How It Happened.

The story is that the lad, with a boy companion, had been to the shop of G. Kirtley, at Pamdenec, for a loaf of bread. On the way back to Epworth Park the boys saw a wire lying across a stump of a tree with the wood smouldering. The Hammond boy picked up the wire to remove it and received the full force of the current, which was said to be at a potential of 4,000 volts. He had his right hand badly burned and a deep burn also was made in his left leg. He died immediately.
