SPORT WRITERS GUESTS AT DINNER

At the Union Club last evening the Canadian Pacific Railway tendered the five visiting sport writers from the United States a dinner prior to their departure across the bay this morning. C. Bruce Burpee, district passenger agent for the C. P. R., was chairman for the occasion. After the toast to the king had been honored the chairman proposed a toast to the city and the province, referring to the unavoidable absence of J. M. Woodman, district superintendent. Mayor McEllen replied to the toast welcoming the visitors and congratulating the C. P. R. on its efforts to bring together the two great nations. Premier Foster responded on behalf of the province wishing the visitors good luck on their hunting trip. He paid a tribute to the C. P. R. He spoke also of the power of the press and said that a great responsibility lay on the press of both countries to maintain a friendly sentiment that the two nations might live in peace and happiness. Frederick G. Lieb, president of the Baseball Writers' Association of America and Sporting Editor of the New York Evening Telegram, made a happy reply in the course of which he said that he believed the power of sport would do much to promote the friendly feeling of which the premier had spoken. He also expressed appreciation of the unbounded hospitality of the C. P. R.

Among the invited guests were: W. F. Burditt, president of the board of trade; R. E. Armstrong, secretary to the board; C. D. Strong, Commissioner John Thornton, Joe Page, well known sport organizer; F. B. Ellis, C. B. Allen, secretary of the N. B. Tourist and Resources Association, and newspaper representatives.

BOY KILLS SCHOOLMATE IN FIGHT OVER GIRL

New York, Oct. 18.—Louis Cicardi, fourteen years old, of Brooklyn, will be arraigned in Children's Court on a charge of juvenile delinquency, as the result of a fist fight in which Leonard Salita, sixteen years old, also of Brooklyn, was killed. Both boys were schoolmates. According to the police the fight was over a girl attending the same school.

Cicardi told the police that while walking with Salita and two other boys through Tompkins Park they met three girls. Cicardi said while he was walking with one of the girls Salita began pushing him. At last Cicardi challenged Salita to go to the corner and fight it out. Salita accepted and, according to Cicardi, Salita struck the first blow, and Cicardi hit Salita on the jaw. The boy did not fall immediately, but put his hands up to fight some more. After a short time he fell to the sidewalk dead.

Witnesses said that the two boys were fighting for about two minutes. Some bacteria may be frozen to the temperature of liquid air and still retain life.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY

The annual meeting of the Natural History Society was held last night in the society rooms with Rev. Dr. David Hutchinson presiding. The report of the curator, William McIntosh, showed a membership of 397. The rooms were visited by twenty-seven classes for examination of the specimens or for talks on nature study; 202 lessons were given by the curator during the season. The exhibit at the St. John Exhibition was also mentioned in the report. Several changes in arrangement of collections have been made. The curator's report was adopted on motion of Geoffrey Stead, who congratulated Mr. McIntosh on his work. The reports of the archaeological and zoological committees were read. F. B. Ellis gave his report as librarian. Mr. McIntosh read the building committee report. The report of the Ladies' Association was given by Mrs. R. B. Rankine. Although more than 1,500 articles had been added to the collections, it was reported that the society was not in a sound condition financially.

The election of officers resulted as follows: President, Rev. Dr. David Hutchinson; 1st vice-president, W. F. Hatheway; 2nd vice-president, F. B. Ellis; treasurer, A. Gordon Leavitt; curator and corresponding secretary, William McIntosh; recording secretary, Henry Morrissey; librarian, Geoffrey Stead; additional members, Dr. J. Roy Campbell, James A. Etey and J. H. Wetmore. The auditors of the previous year, H. Flewelling and J. E. Secord were re-elected. The report of the treasurer showed total receipts of \$1,801.25, an overdraft of \$17.68 and total deficit of \$829.06. During the year the fees of members and the rental of the society's room had fallen off. The grants of \$400 from the city and \$300 from the province were duly acknowledged and a further grant of \$800 given by the province for special needs last year was also gratefully referred to. Mr. Leavitt, however, pointed out the serious condition which the society's finances have placed the society in and recommended drastic action.

MEN'S COMMITTEE WILL ASSIST IN THE Y.W.C.A. CAMPAIGN

A meeting of the board of directors of the Y. W. C. A. was held yesterday afternoon in the King street east centre with Mrs. A. E. Logie presiding. Mrs. Percival Foster presented her first report as general secretary. She had received assurance from the men's committee that their best efforts would be used to further the interests of the campaign for funds. Her report also embraced the work being done now and commended warmly Miss Pepler, the physical director, Dr. Davis Murray and Dr. E. S. Bridges, the medical examiners; the Booster club, the Corona and Loyalty club, Miss Baird, who is in charge of the residence on King street; and Miss Julia Pirie, the office secretary. Mrs. John McAvity read some interesting letters from national headquarters telling of Y. W. C. A. work in the east and of the world's gift fund being started.

Mrs. W. H. Lugsdin consented to act as president until the end of the year and Miss C. O. McIlvren was appointed treasurer in the place of Mrs. P. H. Somerville, who had resigned. Mrs. J. D. Hunter tendered her resignation.

MATERNAL MORTALITY SHOWS AN INCREASE

Much Work Remains To Be Completed.

Washington, Oct. 18.—Maternal mortality is increasing and no progress is being made toward its reduction despite extensive research and development of modern methods, Dr. W. T. Bell of Toronto, pediatrician to the maternal and child welfare bureau of the Ontario Provincial Board of Health, told the delegates attending the annual convention of the National Child Hygiene Association. Much work remains to be done before the maternal death rate will be lowered, he declared, expressing the belief that a large percentage of this mortality is preventable. He added that health education through the public nurse, recently inaugurated in Ontario, was expected to aid greatly in reducing the maternal death rate.

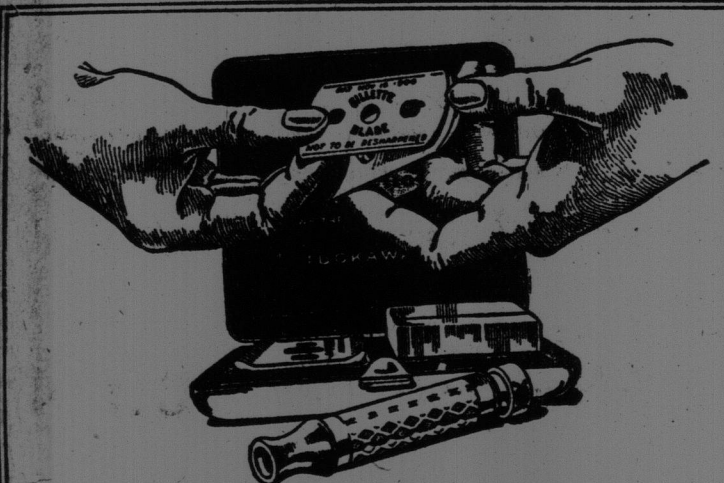
