Formerly, food could only be preserved for a lengthened period by means of foreign substances mixed with it, of which salt was, by far, the most important. These preservatives not only impaired the palatability of such food, but renedered it liable to give rise to serious disease, such as seurcy and the like, when used for a long time to the exclusion of fresh food. The ability, therefore, to have at hand wholesome food, free from artificial preservations, when ordinary fresh food is not to be obtained is a very great convenience and benefit.

Occasionally, however, canned foods prove unwholesome. This is due either to an accident or negligence in canning, or, which is probably oftener the case, to improper handling after they reach the consumer.


