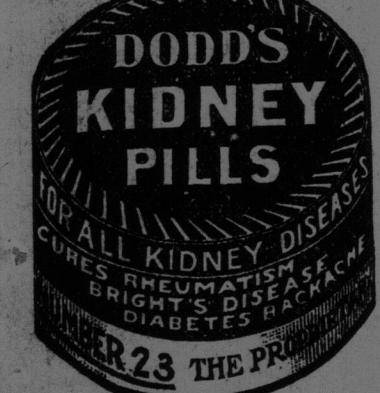
## PERSONALS

## AGAINST UNION BUT FOR BASIS

(Continued from page 1.)

was impracticable. "Milltown had also passed  
a similar resolution. The report was  
received and the committee discharged.  
Rev. W. W. Rainnie, interim moderator  
of the St. Stephen congregation, presented  
the call extended to Ernest B. Wylie, M.  
A., B. D., and prospective Ph. D., now  
assistant lecturer in philosophy in Queens  
University. The congregation guarantees  
\$1,200 a year, a house and a month's vaca-  
tion. Dr. Lawson was heard on behalf of  
the congregation in support of the call.

Mr. Rainnie said the candidate had not  
been ordained and he could not say that  
he had been licensed. He was instructed  
to inquire by wire and a negative reply  
was received some couple of hours later.  
The call was laid on the table until Mr.  
Wylie is licensed.

Rev. Wm. McPherson, of the Halifax  
Presbytery and Rev. F. S. Simpson, of the  
Miramichi Presbytery were welcomed to  
the meeting.

The report of the committee on the re-  
mit touching the supply of students, etc.,  
was submitted by Rev. James Ross and  
was taken up section by section. The  
provision that adequate support to stu-  
dents be assured was approved; that the  
regular course be made as attractive as  
possible, approved; sub sections 4 to 7 ap-  
proved; sec. 8 on training of candidates,  
disapproved; and sec. 4, on the appoint-  
ment of an assembly board of education,  
approved.

Rev. Gordon Dickie reported for the  
home mission committee that more stu-  
dents than usual are in the field this win-  
ter and that the available supply of  
catechists for the coming summer is  
larger than usual. The greatest need for  
more ordained men.

Following the reports showing that the  
ordained ministry at Weymouth was re-  
ceiving only \$750 a year, Hon. J. G. Forbes  
moved that an additional grant of \$100  
be made. Rev. James Ross objected that  
this was in conflict with the regulations.  
Judge Forbes pressed his resolution which  
was carried, Mr. Ross dissenting.

A resolution calling for an inquiry by  
the synod into the possibility of increas-  
ing salaries in a suggested charge was  
unanimously adopted.

Reports of the home mission stations  
were received. Rev. M. S. McKelvey, Wey-  
mouth, and Rev. L. A. McLean were con-  
tinued in their situations for another  
year, and the supply of other fields left to  
the committee.

George Gough, missionary at Scotch  
Ridge, made application that the presby-  
tery apply to the assembly for permission  
for him to qualify for ordination by  
special course of study. The application  
was referred to Montreal College where he  
had previously studied.

The treasurer, Peter Campbell, in his  
annual report showed receipts of \$301, ex-  
penditures, \$240; balance on hand at first  
of year, \$97; at close of year, \$58. The  
report was referred to an audit committee  
of Messrs. White and Edwin Smith.

Rev. J. H. A. Anderson reported for  
the traveling expense fund, receipts of  
\$220 and expenditures of \$202; referred to  
auditing committee.
