FOR OLD SERVANTS

Gratuities Passed By the Ontario Government.

A TOTAL OF \$37,500 FOR YEAR

Retiring Inspector of Asylums, Superintendent of Toronto Asylum, Inspector of Prisons, and Deputy Treasurer Receive the Largest Single Amounts—Grants to Relatives of Those Who Died.

Toronto, Dec. 30.—The Government Thursday passed Orders-in-Council distributing the \$37,500 set apart in a block last session for gratuities for the civil service. In most cases the grants will be paid to men who have retired, and in some to the relatives of men who have died. The total amount for the year, including a few awarded by the former Government, will be \$37,500. The following is a list of gratuities voted for the year, as given out yesterday:

TEMISKAMING RAILWAY.

Commission Presents Ontario's Treasurer With Cheque for \$100,000, Net Earnings From Jan. 16 to Dec. 21.

Toronto, Dec. 30.—Public ownership has proved a gratifying success in connection with the Ontario Government's new railway between North Bay and New Liskeard. Built and conducted by the Government through a commission, the end of its first year's business has resulted in a degree of success described by the Premier and the Provincial Treasurer yesterday as "remarkable." Tangible proof of this gratifying result was forthcoming yesterday when the commission, consisting of Messrs. Cecil B. Smith, chairman and consulting engineer, Jacob L. Englehart, Petrolia, and Dennis Murphy, Ottawa, presented Hon. Treasurer Matheson with a cheque for \$100,000 on account, representing the net earnings from Jan. 15 to Dec. 21.

At the meeting yesterday, terminals and facilities for getting new business and methods for coping with the increasing traffic were discussed.

Government Pleased. The members of the Government expressed personal satisfaction regarding the business-like manner the commissioners handled the road, the success of which, for a new road, is considered remarkable.

The above payment does not represent the whole of the earnings for the year, as there are still ten days to run; nor does it represent the entire road. The Government took over on Jan. 16 last the first section running from North Bay to New Liskeard, and the figures are for this section.

Line Extended. North of New Liskeard the line has been pushed through the forest forty miles to the Abitibi River, and has only another forty miles to go to reach a junction with the proposed G. T. P. route. Two large bridges are being built here, one of which is practically completed.

Remarkable Traffic. The road carried some 75,000 passengers, a remarkable record for a new road, a portion of the traffic consisting of excursions to the Temagami hunting district, besides settlers. The road, in spite of the large traffic, has not to report a single life lost. The freight traffic is understood to be between 80,000 and 90,000 tons.

Arrangements are being concluded by the Government with various industrial concerns in the north, which will materially increase the freight business of the railway.

Belleville Is Flooded. Belleville, Dec. 30.—The heavy rain which fell in the vicinity Thursday night and yesterday morning caused the drains to become choked up, and there has been much discomfort from flooded cellars. In West Belleville, on Coleman, Molra and Everett streets, the water rose to such an extent that some people were unable to leave their homes till neighbors helped them out with ladders and boats. The Molra River, which had a thick coat of ice on it, broke up yesterday.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier in Compton. Ottawa, Dec. 30.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier left yesterday afternoon for Montreal. This afternoon he will speak at Cookshire and in the evening at Lake Megantic. He returns to Ottawa for Sunday.

New P. M. At the Falls. Niagara Falls, Ont., Dec. 30.—Mayor Phlemister has received notice of his appointment as postmaster, succeeding the late A. F. Crow.

HIS MASTER STROKE

Witte Urges Czar to Promulgate a Modern Constitution.

END OF MOSCOW TERROR

Governor-General Doubassoff In An Interview Tells How He Did It—Casualties Will Not Exceed 3,000—Gen. Bogdanovitch Dies of His Wounds—Police Summoned to Massacre the Jews.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 2.—It is learned from a high source that Premier Witte is again strongly urging the Emperor to immediately promulgate a modern constitution for the double purpose of reassuring the Liberals that the present war against the "Reds" does not mean reaction and blocking the attempt which undoubtedly will be made when the National Assembly convenes to transform that body into a constituent assembly. Moreover the plan has other heavy backing, and the Emperor is showing an inclination to accept it. The Premier is understood to have informed His Majesty that such an act would be a master stroke at the present juncture, and might rally the whole body of Conservative and Liberal opinion to the side of the Government.

Dies From Wounds. London, Jan. 2.—A despatch to a news agency from St. Petersburg says that Gen. Bogdanovitch, Vice-Governor-General of Tamboff, Central Russia, who was wounded three times with revolver shots Dec. 28, has died of his wounds.

Police Summoned to Massacre. Warsaw, Jan. 2.—Notices have been posted in parts of the city summoning the police to assemble for a massacre of the Jews who are accused of provoking the strikers and disturbances, and bringing distress to the workmen.

Repressing the Revolutionists. St. Petersburg, Jan. 2.—The policy of repressing the revolutionists continues with a vengeance. Their announcement that they proposed to carry on a guerilla warfare until a general armed revolt is prepared has stimulated the Government to redoubled energy. Nevertheless the Workmen's Council and the executive committee of the social revolutionists are managing to evade arrest and are meeting each day at a different place in the outskirts of the city. The patrols are understood to have orders not to spare bullets if they are attacked by persons using bombs or revolvers.

An interview with Governor-General Doubassoff was printed yesterday, in which he explains that the duration of the revolt is owing to the extent of the region in which the military forces are operating and owing to the lack of troops which compelled Doubassoff to await reinforcements from Warsaw and St. Petersburg before giving the revolutionists their death blow.

Covered Them Up. "The most difficult task," the Governor-General continued, "was to

them from their base on the Kazan Railroad between Moscow and Perov (three miles east of Moscow), and surround them in the Presna district, so as to prevent their escape. Both these tasks were successfully accomplished. "The strikers of the Prokharoff Mills who held the proprietor as a hostage were ready to surrender Friday, but not Mink, who conducted the negotiations, declined to accept their surrender unless they also delivered up the "Drufinists," the soldiers of the revolutionists, who had sought refuge there."

Governor-General Doubassoff further declared emphatically that the artillery bombarded only the houses from which the revolutionists fired. Casualties 3,000. Governor-General Doubassoff has not yet given the figures of the losses during the fighting at Moscow, saying that it is impossible for them to more than make a guess. However, he places the outside limit at 3,000. The troops and police do not suffer nearly so heavily, and it is reported that up to Thursday night there were less than 50 casualties among them everywhere.

Governor-General Doubassoff has posted an imperial ukase guaranteeing pardon to strikers who have not used arms. A terrible affair occurred at a workman's tea house in Novaya Derevyina street near the Presna district. It was surrounded by the Black Hundreds, who finally applied the torch and were watching the victims inside consumed by the flames, when Cossacks arrived on the scene.

The papers publish terrible pictures of the conditions prevailing along the Siberian Railway. There are no railway officials on duty, and on the section so far as Chelabinsk, Government of Orenburg, all the stations have been pillaged. Complete anarchy prevails at Irkutsk. The military trains are running without order or proper engineers.

Session of Douma. Forseeing the probability that it will be impossible to hold elections in the Baltic provinces, the Caucasus and other disturbed districts, the Government has provided that when the certificates of half the members elected are received the Douma will be immediately convened.

At Riga. Riga, Government of Livonia, Jan. 2.—Three policemen were killed during Sunday night.

Gen. Count Sollogub, the new Governor-General of the Baltic provinces, who is marching on this city with a large force of troops, is expected Wednesday.

In the Lettish portion of the Baltic provinces the situation is quieter, no serious outbreak has occurred recently. Troops are pursuing revolutionary bands from Dvinsk and Dvinsk.

Women in Council. Mitva, Courland, Russia, Jan. 2.—Four columns of troops, principally cavalry and artillery are converging toward Mitva and Riga. The insurgents in the towns held by them are instituting a social democratic administration as if they were in permanent possession. At Frankenburg a woman of 70 and two girls sit in the new council.
