McMORRIS AT VICTORIA.

Hugh J. McCormick, champion of the world,

was the central figure at Victoria

last night, and his appearance was

greeted with loud applause. After preliminary

lapse Hugh took the scratch and was off with the word "go".

His first two or three laps were at a three minute gallop,

long even strokes, and a clock-like click of his

spurs time the runners left the ice. His speed

did not seem to vary in the least although he

finished the half a little behind time, in 1:25 and the first mile in 3:16.

The second mile was done in 3:27 and the third in 3:30 making 643 for the two and 1613 for the three miles.

This does not by any means beat the best record for three miles, although it is better than that of McCormick's previous

performances, his time for three miles recorded up to last evening being 10:40 done in 1887.

Pullen's amateur record made in 1884 was 10:33 2/5. But at Newburg, March 31, Joseph Donohue beat both the three and five mile records, following by a table of time.

Donohue's record for three miles was 10:29, five miles 10:16, and ten miles 32:28.

The morning's last event was very creditable, and would have been better had the two or three mile races not been on the list.

The other events were: H. Ring won the two mile amateur race in 7:17, defeating H. Courtney. The one mile boy's race was won by John McCormick in 1:15, against Walter Dunbar, James Nagle and Thomas McCormick. Fred Riley defeated Chas. Irvine in a mile handicap in 4:05. O. Stevens won a half mile race in 1:10, 1:54 1/2. Clancy defeated W. Wilson and J. West. We remain.
