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A RAID AT HARROW

Bank Robbers Try Their Hand There This Time.

Were Unable to Blow the Safe but Committed Some Other Depredations.

There was another attempted bank robbery at Harrow last night. The raid on the bank was not successful, but a couple of stores were looted and the thieves made good their escape.

It is believed the robbers came from Detroit. At McGregor Junction they stole a car from the L. E. & D. R. R., and about eleven o'clock were heard working themselves towards Harrow. It is believed there must have been four in the gang because they lifted the haul on the track without trouble, or without leaving any mark.

This two men could not do. Arrived at Harrow they commenced operations by robbing the railway station. They got 16 cents for their trouble. Then they attacked the private bank there, but evidently being inexperienced at bank robbery, they were unable to blow the safe, although they tried.

They robbed the store next door, however, and got \$15. They also stole a lot of jewelry from the local jeweller. Detectives Campbell and Macneary were early on the scene, but of course the thieves were gone long before. A peculiarity of the case is that though the Lake Erie Railway authorities have instituted enquiries all along their line, they have absolutely failed to get any trace of their handiwork.

The current opinion is that the robbers were Detroit crooks, who, having heard of the recent successful bank robbery in Canada, tried their hands at the game without great success.

THE MARKETS

Wheat.—The price is the same as last quoted, at 68 cents, with light receipts. The western markets are higher, which tends to strengthen our markets here a little.

Oats.—The situation is the same as last quoted, with prices for export a little lower. Nearly all receipts are absorbed. However, for local use.

Corn.—There is very little demand for this cereal for feed. The price now is 36 cents. The demand for seed is somewhat better. Some kinds are wanted, such as long yellow, and especially smut nose, the earliest of all Canadian corn.

Beans.—No movement, either as to receipts or shipments. Values east, if anything, duller.

Barley.—All sales now noted are for feed, and it is not worth more than 70 cents a bushel.

Wool.—The product is beginning to arrive sparingly. Unwashed is worth 9 cents, washed 12 cents. Tab washed wool is wanted, but not at all.

Australian and African wools command the highest prices just now, they being finer in grade than Canadian wool. In former years Canadian wools commanded the best prices, but the changes in fashion have affected the kind of wool wanted.
