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

The captain nobly did his duty, and with a courage and fortitude which is seldon seen, attended in person to the wants of his passengers. In this heroic labor he was ably second-ed by his officers and the physician on board ; but so malignant was the disease that their efforts were not only unavailing, but they them selves fell victims to it, On the twenty-seventh ult. the captain died, on the thirteenth the mate. The doct or, the second mate, and the steward escaped after a severe illness. The passengers died like sheep, and so few were left that it was almost by a miracle that the Simoon ever arriv od here. When she arrived she reported, out of two hundred and forty seven passengers and crew, that more than one half had died, and many of the remainder were sick. The case has ed much interest and sympathy here, and is considered as one of the strangest as well as the most mournful on record."
