

Railroad Bridge Swept Away, Several Locks Destroyed, Light and Power Plants Put Out of Business by an Overgrown Leak

CORNWALL, Ont., June 23—One of the worst breaks that ever took place in the Cornwall Canal, and it certainly was the most disastrous, has occurred at the O. & N. Y. railway bridge just above Lock 15.

BLOCK BURNED; LOSS HALF A MILLION

PORT CHESTER, N. Y., June 22—Defying the efforts of firemen from this and several nearby towns, a fire which was raging uncontrolled for two hours today before it was checked, destroyed a block of buildings occupied chiefly by business firms, rendered forty families homeless and entailed a loss of \$500,000.

RELIEF MEASURES FOR THE FIRE SUFFERERS
