FRASER CO. PLANS AGAIN ENDORSED

At a meeting here today of holders of common stock of the Fraser Companies, Limited, plans for reorganization as endorsed recently at Montreal meetings of the holders of various classes of the companies' notes and bonds, were approved unanimously. The attendance at the meeting represented 69 per cent. of the shares in the company.

OPEN SEASON FOR BIG GAME AND GAME BIRDS

Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 15.—Open seasons for big game and game birds in New Brunswick during the autumn of 1932 are as follows: BULL MOOSE—October 1 to November 30.

DEER—October 1 to November 30 with exception of Grand Manan, Campobello, and Deer Island.

PARTRIDGE—October 1 to October 15 except on Grand Manan, Campobello, and Deer Island.

DUCKS, GEESE, BRANT, COOTS, GALLINULES, and RAILS—September 15 to December 31 with the exception of Grand Manan, Deer Island, and Campobello where the season is October 15 to January 31.

WOODCOCK, WILSON, or JACK SNIFE—October 1 to November 30. Non-residents may take four bears under the big game moose license and two bears under the deer license.

N. B. Agricultural School to Open At Capital Nov. 1

Fredericton, Sept. 19.—The New Brunswick Agricultural School will conduct its 10th short course at the Dominion Experimental Station here from Nov. 1 to Dec. 9.

The course offered is of a general nature, designed for boys of 16 years of age and over who wish to improve their knowledge of agricultural science and to increase their general practical efficiency about the farm. A condensed course of five weeks' duration has been arranged to facilitate attendance by boys who cannot be spared from the farm for a longer period.

The curriculum includes animal husbandry, veterinary science, dairying, bee-keeping, poultry, horticulture, field husbandry, and farm mechanics. Lectures will be held in the gymnasium of the Experimental Station and the free use of the grounds and buildings of the station will be available to students to augment theory by practical demonstration.

New-York, Sept. 19.—Turning for a brief moment from matters of finance to morals, Mayor Joseph P. McKee today placed an official ban against a recent revival of burlesque shows in West 42nd street the heart of Broadway.
