HEAVYWEIGHTS FLOCK TO N. Y. AFTER REICH

Now that the heavyweights are gathering around New York it should be possible to pick out an opponent for Al Reich without going to extremes.

Beyond a doubt New York's new candidate for heavyweight honors is the most promising that city has put into the field in years. He is sure to be a big factor in New York boxing this winter, providing his back exercise some discretion in making his matches.

Jim Flynn, who just arrived from Kansas City, where he ended the championship aspirations of Al Reich, is now spoken of as Reich's next opponent. This match would be more logical than the one between Reich and the Puerto Rican veteran in a class by himself. It will be by victories over him that Luther McKay, Gunboat Smith and Jim Coffey established themselves, and Reich would do well to follow their example.

Al Palmer is another whom Reich might dispose of before attempting to humble the hard-hitting Gunboat. Palmer is due to arrive in New York this week for the express purpose of challenging the former amateur champion. Reports from the middle west state that Palmer has been working hard to get into shape ever since he defeated Fred Fulton in three rounds early this summer.

Of course both Flynn and Palmer are no longer in the running for the title, but neither is Fred McKay. Both are game enough to try out the new-comer's courage, and meeting them would give him much needed experience. Just at present Reich lacks steadiness under fire, and until this fault has been removed it would be foolish to expect him to face Gunboat's heavy blows.

Terry Kellar, a starring heavy-weight who recently arrived in New York, is another to challenge Reich. According to his manager, George Lawrence, Kellar is a Californian who has just completed a tour of Australia and England. Lawrence writes that Kellar's claim to fame rests on this circumstance more than anything else, as the rest of his history is omitted. Lawrence states that while Kellar is anxious to show his places in New York, only the better class of heavyweights need apply.

BRAVES WON'T GIVE GIANTS CHANCE TO START A SPURT

The thing troubling the Giants now, well reconcile itself to a fond farewell to the pennant of 1914. Three and a half games could be overcome easily enough in some circumstances but not when the team holding the advantage is dashing along at a terrific speed and there is no sign of slackening up.

The St. Louis Cardinals have been looked upon as the team that would stop the Braves if any club would accomplish that feat, but the outcome of the first engagement of the Cards in Boston indicates that their fate is to be no better than that of others who have made sorties into Cantonment.

And if the Cards can't do it what prospect is there that Pittsburgh, Chicago or Cincinnati will succeed? None, we should say, unless fate decrees that the unexpected is to happen; usually it doesn't. At best it's a frail straw to grasp at, and can't be depended upon extensively to aid the Giants in their desperate battle to beat the Braves to the finish line.

Grasping at Straws.

Speaking of the straws the Giants and their followers are ready to catch at any lying around loose and they are finding a basis for some kind of hope in the improved showing of the team upon its return to the Polo Ground to open the long campaign here. The Giants routed Cincinnati in a way that gratified the demands of the most exacting rotters and the clean, business like way in which they went about their work aroused visions of a slap-dash rally that will yet lead them out of the wilderness. They played like regular champions in that game and this, accentuated by indifferent work on the part of the leadership Reds, made them look better than they have in many a day.

"Getting the jump" is one of the first principles of attaining success on the athletic field and from the way the Giants started off their demonstration they have been taking to heart a few vigorous lectures on this topic. They rolled up five runs as a starter and they did it on two solid hits at the right moment, aided by a base on balls. Fletcher drove in two runs by a slashing third base with the way the Reds made them look better than they have in many a day.

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Merkle Perks Up.

Merkle, who has been specializing recently in hitting into double plays, was one of the straws the "fans" grabbed at. In addition to his home run he smashed out a triple and enjoyed a batting average of .500 for the day. Of course, no one expects Merkle to continue at that pace, but any indication that he has recovered from his prolonged batting slump helps to push the good cause of restoring confidence along.

Connie Mack's great second baseman fell off .002 points last week, yet he passed both Dick Hoblitzell of the Red Sox and Joe Jackson of the Naps, who are third and fourth.
