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Shipping Notes.

The brigantine *Citizen*, Peters master, from Port Spain, Trinidad, for Liverpool, N. S., in ballast, was towed into St. Georges, Bermuda, during the gale of the 1st inst., with foremast sprung, loss of lower topsail-yard, foretopmast, foretopmast, and several sails. Vessel leaking badly and short of provisions. Captain reports having left Trinidad on the 28th Oct., and experienced a continuation of gales with a very high sea, from the 18th to the 28th Nov. Has been within 500 miles of Liverpool, but was obliged on the 22d ult. to bear up for Bermuda; will repair and proceed with despatch.

A *Serious Charge*. - Capt. McComisky, of schr. C. M. Pettinelli, at North Sydney, C. B., from Newfoundland, writes to the *Herald* that on the 19th and 20th inst. the light on the North-east part of St. Paul's Island was not burning. This is rather a serious charge to make against a light keeper and one requiring investigation, as it involves the lives of many of our brave seamen who look to this light for their guidance.

The Dominion steamer *Lady Head* returned to Halifax from Sable Island on the 24th inst., where she had taken supplies of coal and oil for the Lighthouses. She brought up a few packages of dye stuffs that had washed ashore, it is supposed from the steamer *Wyoming*, when she touched on the bar at that place. She reports all well on the Island, and that no casualties have occurred there since her last visit. The steamer is to be dismantled preparatory to undergoing repairs to her machinery. She will re-appear to resume her trips to the Island by the middle of February.

The brig *Silas Auld* - Telegraphic advices to Messrs. J. & S. Leonard, received this morning, report that the *Silas Auld*, Smith master, which went out on the 28th Jan. Florida, was got off on the 28th inst. The vessel is perfectly tight.

Fire.

A fireman says that a boy ran to Mr. Gerow's, where the key of Box 15 is kept, and that Mr. Gerow would not open the Box or give him the key. The boy then ran to the other Box, without saying but socks on his feet, and gave the alarm, the fire gaining headway all the time.
