Canadian, British and Foreign. [To the Associated Press.]

Baltimore, Md., March 20. The names of the ten men brought to this port by S. S. Nureburg, taken off the ship, Geo. S. Fogg, are Andrew Mooney and Thos. Mooney, brothers; William Reuben; Patrick and Michael Tobin; John Turt; James Grant, aged 14, whose brother, Joseph Grant, perished; James Pottle; Thomas Barra, whose brother, Michael Barra, perished; and Benjamin Ranscower. The party comprised nearly the entire able-bodied male population of the town of St. Mary's, Mooney says he has six children, and that some of those who had died have families equally large. The men were taken in charge by the British consul to-day, who will probably send them home in the steamer Caplain, which goes to Halifax this week.

Secretary of the Treasury Bristol has resigned. LONDON, March 20. Revival preachers, who opened the movement in Liverpool yesterday, were stoned in the Irish quarter. There is no truth in the report that Bismarck will be made Duke of Lauenburg.

LONDON, March 20. THE THROBORN MAST. The thousand sympathizers of the Tichborne claimant met at Hyde Park to-day with music, banners, &c. Dr. Kenney, and Messrs. Onslow and Whalley, made speeches, and the people took the horses from the carriages of those gentlemen and dragged them instead. A resolution was adopted denouncing the partiality of the Judges at the trial, and asserting that there shall be no rest until the judicial crisis be rectified.

DEATH OF AN M. P. John Martin, M. P. for Meath, died to-day, aged 68. SPAIN'S EXILED ROYALS. The Duke of Montpensier having applied to Marquis, the Spanish ambassador, for a passport to Spain, he declined to grant it. The reason assigned was that if a passport was given to the Duke, ex-Queen Isabella would deem herself equally entitled to one, and the Madrid Government considered her return to Spain inopportune.

THE PARLIAMENT OF CANADA. OTTAWA, March 20. The House sat until near midnight on Saturday evening to dispose of business so as to bring the session to a close.

The Supreme Court Bill was amended in several clauses. It still remains in committee, and will be carried through. Palmer moved a clause to simplify the mode of appeal.

To-day several Government measures passed various stages. Two of the bills introduced by the Minister of Marine were dropped. The second reading of the bill for the construction of the railway to Vancouver Island is causing some discussion.

Tupper declares there is reason to apprehend that Americans interested in the Northern Pacific will succeed in obtaining the contract at both ends of the Canadian road.

Mackenzie denies that there is any ground for such suspicion. LEGISLATURE OF NEW BRUNSWICK. HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

After recess Mr. Williams testified. He said any one who stops to consider the expense of running three Legislatures, with all the machinery of Government, for three small Provinces, and to contrast it with the expense of running one, he will be led to believe that the latter is the only way. First, there would be a saving of \$210,000 to the whole country of the salaries of Governors, as well as a further saving of many thousands of dollars to the three Provinces concerned in keeping up establishments which under a union will be dispensed with. There will be a further saving in Executive management and in Legislative expenses. The Executive, the expenses of the three Provinces range as high as \$24,470, but \$21,650 for Nova Scotia, \$21,270 for New Brunswick, and \$11,650 for Prince Edward Island. Under the scheme of union, as he would propose it, a saving in this class of expenditure of \$18,870 would be effected.

The next saving would be in Legislative expenses. At present the cost is \$81,885, being \$40,857 for Nova Scotia, \$31,122 for New Brunswick, and \$10,906 for Prince Edward Island. Under the scheme of Union, by dispensing with the three Houses of Assembly, which comprise 109 members, and three Legislative Councils, and establishing one House of Assembly of 60 members, and one Legislative Council of 20 members, the cost of the former would be \$27,840, and of the latter \$8,821. This, of course, simply embraces the pay and travelling expenses of members, but there must be added the ordinary expenses of machinery for carrying on these bodies, which figured at \$17,070, and added to the sums already given, would make the total cost something in the neighborhood of \$35,341. These amounts added to the savings already computed, and some trifling amounts not enumerated, would make the total saving fully \$100,000.
