The best methods of canning, drying and storing are given, as well as many tested recipes. The booklet may be obtained for only 5 cents from the Fruit Branch of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

THE WESTERN FAIR

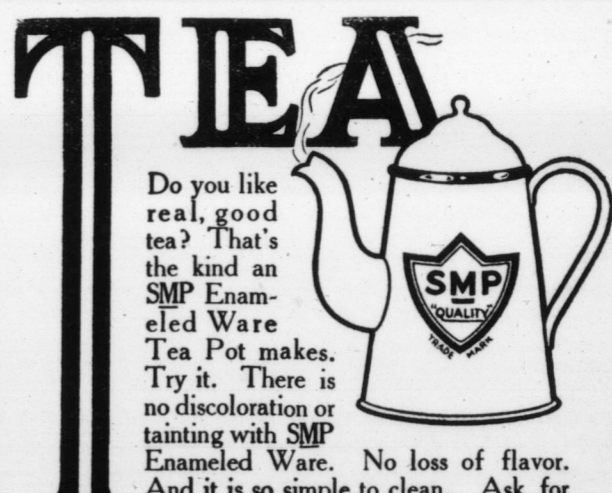
London, September 8th to 15th, 1923
