## Interesting Letter From Pte. Garner

HE WRITES SOMEWHERE IN GERMANY.

The following very interesting letter has been received by Miss Jessie Bruce from a popular Waterloo Soldier and will be read with interest by his many friends in town. Somewhere in Germany, December 18, 1918.

Miss Jessie Bruce, Sec'y. Waterloo Red Cross Society, Waterloo, Ont.

My Dear Friend: Yesterday was a lucky day for me as I received four lovely parcels, one in particular was the garden issue, being from our lovely ladies of dear old Waterloo Red Cross Society. In my estimation a letter is a poor reward for all you have done for me since I had to leave you to do my bit—but I certainly am pleased to tell you that I am looking forward to that lovely time to come when I can meet you all and thank you from the bottom of my heart. There were times when it was impossible to answer your lovely parcels and those were the times they had the parcels not arrived. I have been a poor lookout for you. So you may know by that you kept the spirit of the troops up. Those were the nights that our thoughts wandered back to dear old Waterloo and it will never be forgotten. Well Dear Friends this has certainly been a long, long trail but the old First Canadian Battalion is right here represented by a few of the old (11-). We have had many a laugh about the old street car from Berlin to Berlin. Well Dear Friends I must tell you that Cologne is a Jake place. We marched right through.

ough. Of course it was not quite like marching through Waterloo at the same time we got quite a few (Glad Eyes) but as we were marching to attention (Mum's the word). I am sending a map, the first possible chance. Some may have received them as we were not first here. They are a nice souvenir. We had a big day yesterday as General Macdonell came to see us, and he certainly got us excited as he said we may soon be on our way. Believe me that did sound good. Well Miss Jessie I hope when you receive this you will be in good health, also Miss Lizzie. We are having a rest now as it has been a very hard time for us. We have been doing 24 miles a day with full pack and some parts have been very bad for travelling, but we are very proud to think we marched one end to the other. From our starting point up to now is well over 350 miles and we are not Right There but our Heart is. I mean in Waterloo. Well Miss Jessie I will certainly try and send you a few cards as soon as possible as I will have a little more time now. I received 2 lovely letters from my darling wife, and they certainly made me feel dandy. So now my True Friend with all my kindest thoughts to all the ladies of the Waterloo Red Cross Society, yourself and Miss Lizzie, I remain, Yours as ever true friend,

## Subscribing Freely to the Syrian Fund

IN AID OF THE UNFORTUNATE PEOPLE.

Subscriptions to the fund for the relief of stricken Syria that are being received by Mrs. Reshaw, are being made by public spirited citizens, whose hearts have been touched by the appeal.

In a conversation with Mr. Reshaw the seriousness of the situation in the far off country was impressed. Town after town has suffered heavily.

A Syrian journal published in New York reveals a terrible state of affairs. Thousands of names of missing people are mentioned and many a friend is overcome with grief when he sees the names of persons whom he knew. An example of the list will be given in a subsequent issue.

An illustration of the awful conditions is imparted in a bit of intelligence regarding a woman at Ferhata, who was found dead, with her shoes in her mouth. Such was the desperation in the hour of starvation. In another place the skeleton remains of three children, was all that was left of these young people.

All this was brought about by the scarcity of the materials necessary for an existence. Firstly the Turk took all crops from the people and handed them over to the soldier. Then also the ravages of an oriental insect, somewhat similar to the grasshopper, destroyed crops in 1916 and rendered the soil unfit for present cultivation.

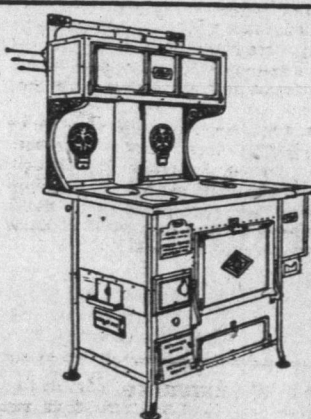
