## TAKE BAIBURT GOOD RICH BLOOD Swift Advance Is Made Against

Turks in Caucasus. nd Duke Nicholas' Forces Have

City, but Have Occupied a Whole Line of Turkish Villages—Turks Are Resisting Desperately Near Mochan but Without Success. LONDON, July 17 .- The official LONDON, July 17.—The official statement from Petrograd regarding the fighting on the Caucasus front announces swift advance by the Russian troops and headlong retreat by the Turks in a number of sectors. The capture on Saturday night of the important city of Baiburt is announced together with the occupation of a whole line of Turkish villages. South-west of Mochan the Turks are showing desperate resistance, but the fighting is in favor of the Russians.

In the region of Irzindjan 18 Turk-

In the region of Irzindjan 18 Turkish officers and 100 Askaris, with a machine gun, were taken. A Cossack detachment also cut off and captured 29 officers and 282 Askaris and a machine gun, as well as regimental records, stores, and ammunition. On the upper Tchoruk important progress was made, and the Russians are consolidating the captured positions. South-west of Mush the Russians dislodged the Turks from all their strongly fortified positions. A Turkish division, recently arrived from Thrace, abandoned its tents and retreated, partly towards the Eastern Euphrates and partly in the direction of Diarbekr.

The official report says:

"Black Sea: During the last cruise one of our torpedo boats sank 26 sailing boats.

"Caucasus: On the night of the 16th cur brave Caucasian army carried by assault Baiburt, which is an important strategic point of convergence. In many sectors the Turks fell back in haste, destroying their depots. In this region and in the basin of the uppor Tchoruk we made a further considerable advance and consolidated the Turkish positions which we had captured.

"Thus during the recent days our valiant army, with its well known pluck and courage, gained a series of battles in the regions of Baiburt, Mamakhatun, and Mush."

Russians Force Teutons to Retreat.

Russians Force Teutons to Retreat PETROGRAD, July 17.—In Volhynia the Russians in the region of Ostron and Goubine have put down heavy Teutonic attacks, launched in mass formation, and forced the Teutons to retreat to avoid the danger of being outflanked, according to the Russian official communication is sued Sunday evening. Upwards of 3,006 men were captured in the fighting. The official statement says:

"In Volhynia, in the region southeast of Sviniusky (in the vicinity of Lutsk), the enemy in mass formation took the offensive at several places. By energetic counter-attacks we repulsed them and continue to develop our success.


