SLAVS TAKE BAIBURT

Swift Advance Is Made Against Turks in Caucasus.

Grand Duke Nicholas' Forces Have Not Only Captured Important City, but Have Occupied a Whole Line of Turkish Villages—Turks Are Resisting Desperately Near Mochan but Without Success.

LONDON, July 17.—The official statement from Petrograd regarding the fighting on the Caucasus front announces swift advance by the Russian troops and headlong retreat by the Turks in a number of sectors.

In the region of Irizindjan 18 Turkish officers and 100 Askaris, with a machine gun, were taken. A Cossack detachment also cut off and captured 29 officers and 282 Askaris and a machine gun, as well as regimental records, stores, and ammunition.

The official report says: "Black Sea: During the last cruise one of our torpedo boats sank 28 sailing boats. Caucasus: On the night of the 16th our brave Caucasian army carried by assault Baiburt, which is an important strategic point of convergence.

Thus during the recent days our valiant army, with its well known pluck and courage, gained a series of battles in the regions of Baiburt, Makhhatun, and Mush."

Russians Force Teutons to Retreat. PETROGRAD, July 17.—In Volynia the Russians in the region of Ostroff and Goubine have put down heavy Teutonic attacks, launched in mass formation, and forced the Teutons to retreat to avoid the danger of being outflanked, according to the Russian official communication issued Sunday evening.

"On many sectors in the region of Ostroff and Goubine we overthrew the enemy despite his stubborn resistance, and he retreated hastily, owing to the danger of being outflanked. One of our regiments captured here one heavy and one light battery. We also took numerous cannon which had been installed in isolated positions."

The total number of prisoners taken in this combat is not yet known, but upward of 3,000 already have been reported."

BRITISH PENETRATE SINAI. Two British Columns Have Gone 60 Miles Into the Interior.

LONDON, July 17.—Two British columns have just completed successful operations on the Sinai Peninsula, where Turkish and Arabian bands have been making raids along the Suez Canal. The columns, operating from Tor and Abu Zeenema, on the Sinai shore of the Gulf of Euz, penetrated 60 miles into the desert and hostile country.

"Prisoners and live stock were captured," says a War-Office statement. "Despite opposition and sniping the British suffered no casualties."

The official report says: "The commander-in-chief of the Mediterranean expeditionary force, telegraphing Saturday, reports that two columns operating from Tor and Abu Zeenema, on the Sinai shore of the Gulf of Suez, have returned to their bases after successful raids on the enemy posts in the peninsula."

"Sixty miles of difficult country were traversed, prisoners were taken and live stock was secured. Despite opposition and considerable sniping no casualties were sustained by either of the columns."

Fierce Battle in Italian Theatre. LONDON, July 17.—Fierce fighting took place Sunday in the Italian theatre of war, according to reports received from both Vienna and Rome.

The Austrians state officially that ten violent counter-attacks delivered in succession north-east of Monte Rasta resulted in heavy losses for the Italians.

Italian troops have stormed and carried Austrian positions at the entrance of the Posina valley and have gained ground in the valley of Travenanso.

Guardships Were Armed Trawlers. LONDON, July 17.—Replying to the German Admiralty announcement of Saturday that a 7,000-ton British auxiliary cruiser and three guardships were sunk in the North Sea two columns operating from Tor and Abu Zeenema, the British Admiralty Saturday stated: "There is no truth in the report of the sinking of an auxiliary cruiser, and the guardships were armed trawlers."


