Pemberton, Max. "Beatrice of Venice," Toronto: The Copp. Clark Co., Limited Cloth, illustrated, \$1.50. Venice and Verona during the early years of Bona parte's ascendancy in Europe form the arena for this tomance Intrigue, conflict and adventure fill its pages, the whole enerteling a powerful love story. The author is an adept at handling a rapidly moving and complex plot and interest is maintained to the end.

Pebins, Elizabeth. "The Magnetic North." McLeod & Allen. Cioth, \$1.25. A story remarkable in itself and still more remarkable in that it was written by a woman. The descriptions of the Long Trail. the Mining Camp, and the Great Stampede imply first hand knowledge and experience as well as literary genius. The style is virile and realistic and the dialect is a convincing vehicle for ironic humor. The old Kentucky Colonel and his "Boy pardner" engage the sympathy of the reader as types of men who through the degrading influences of mining life preserve their ideals and their loyalty to each other.

1905 YEAR BOOKS AND ALMANACS.
"HE publishers of "Who's Who" (7s 6d net), "The Englishwoman's Year Book" (2s 6d net), and the "Who's Who Year Book" (Is not). (Adam & Charles Black, London), have recently issued the 1905

volumes of these invaluable books of reference.
