

An Act to authorize the Court of Chancery and the Courts of Queen's Bench and Common Pleas in Upper Canada, to admit William Darley Pollard to practise as a Solicitor and Attorney.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Legislature of Upper Canada, passed in the second year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled, "*An Act to repeal part of and amend an Act passed in the thirty-seventh year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled, 'An Act for the better regulating the practice of the Law,' and to extend the provisions of the same,*" it is amongst other things enacted, that from and after the passing of the said Act, no person shall be admitted by the Court of King's Bench to practise as an Attorney unless upon actual service under articles for five years with some Attorney: And whereas, it appears by the Petition of William Darley Pollard, of the Town of Collingwood and County of Simcoe in this Province, and by certificates and documents produced by him in support thereof, that the petitioner was duly admitted on the Roll of Attorneys in the Courts of Queen's Bench, Common Pleas, and Exchequer of England, in Trinity Term, 1846, and a Solicitor of the High Court of Chancery on the 10th day of June, 1846, and practised as such until the year 1854: And whereas the said Petitioner now resides in this Province and intends to become a permanent resident thereof, and is desirous of practising in the Courts of Law and Equity therein, and it is expedient to relieve him from the disability imposed by the said Act: Therefore Her Majesty, &c., enacts as follows:

Preamble.

Act of Upper Canada, 2 G. 4, c. 5.

I. It shall and may be lawful for the Court of Queen's Bench, the Court of Common Pleas, and the Court of Chancery in Upper Canada, respectively, in their discretion to admit the said William Darley Pollard to practise as an Attorney and Solicitor therein respectively, any law or statute to the contrary notwithstanding.

The Courts in Upper Canada may admit W. D. Pollard as an Attorney, &c.

II. This Act shall be deemed a public Act.
