Re Chatham Banner Printing Co Judgment (R.) on appeal by Equidator from the certificate of the Master in Ordinary in a winding up matter allowing the claim of the Bank of Montreal against the company at \$1,335.36, the amount of elever promissory notes made by the Man-ager of the company and endorsed by it. During the proceedings before the Master the Manager of the bank was being examined by the liquidator as to certain notes which it was alleged had been charged at maturity to the company's account by the direction of Ford, the Manager of the com pany, instead of to his own private pany, instead of to his own private account, which was also kept at the bank. The Master refused to allow any investigation of Ford's account because he was not a party, holding that such was prohibited by the bank for 1890 see 46 Held that such was proact, 1890, sec. 46 Held, that sec. 46 is one of two sections found under the heading arnual statement and in-The first requires the directors to submit a full statement of the shareholders and the second enacts that no person who is not a director shall be allowed to inspect the account of any person dealing with the bank. The intention of this was probably to do away with the right which a shareholder as a quasi partner might possibly have asserted of inspecting accounts, but whatever the intention it cannot apply to a case like this. 
