

They have also secured the Wingham Lacrosse Club, champions of Huron District, and Walkertons, champions of the Saugeen District, to give an exhibition of the national game. Prof. Van Every of Galt, high rope and trapeze artiste, has been secured for the occasion. The Citizen's Band of Walkerton, will discourse sweet music during the day. Contracts have been signed by all the performers (with forfeit) and all parties going to Mildmay may rest assured of seeing the whole programme carried out without a hitch. A grand Calithumpian parade is being arranged for that day. All umpires, referees, judges, etc., are selected by the directors and are instructed to call the games sharp on time. The afternoon train going south will be held until 6:45, and the night train for the north will leave at 10:15 instead of 9:35, thereby giving people an opportunity to attend the variety entertainment in the evening.
