Visit of U. S. Fleet To Europe Discussed

London Papers Express the View That American Naval Power Will Be Impressed Upon the Diplomats. LONDON, May 15.—The Standard, commenting editorially this morning on the proposed Mediterranean visit of the American fleet, which it refers to as the "mighty flotilla," says: "Europe will have brought home to it a fact which it is too often disposed to ignore. In their opinions of the relative strength of maritime forces, the statesmen and publicists of the old world sometimes forget to direct their gaze beyond the Atlantic. They will be reminded that the United States is still the second naval power of the globe. It chooses to hold aloof from the various alliances, understandings and rivalries of the European system, but if it pleased it could throw its weight into the scale with decisive effect. There is no reason to suppose it has any immediate intention of departing from its traditional policy. It is not without significance that this remarkable illustration of American potentialities is to be given in that quarter of the world, which at present is undergoing reconstruction and political transition. It is at least a very forcible hint that when American diplomacy cares to assert itself it can do so with the only kind of backing our modern diplomatists hardly recognize."

A Good Year A DUKEDOM FOR CARNEGIE

Brant Avenue Church is Making Splendid Progress. Brant Avenue church held its annual congregational meeting last evening in the lecture room. A good attendance was present. Reports were presented from the choir, the Sons, the Epworth League, the Mission Band, the Mission Circle, the Sunday school, the classes, the Brotherhood, the Women's Missionary Society, the Ladies' Aid Society and the Quarterly and Trustee Boards. The pastor, Rev. A. E. Hall, presided. All departments reported progress and prosperity. The total missionary gifts show increase over last year. The Ladies' Aid Society completed their payment of the \$1000 promised the trustees. The Sunday school reported increased average attendance and giving. Mr. A. S. Dwyer, the church treasurer, reported that when the year closed on May 31st, the board expected not only to be able to pay all current expenses but to take \$1000 more off the church debt. The members of the congregation feel pleased over the fine year's work completed.

LARGE SUM TO BE ASKED OF GALT TAXPAYERS

For School Purposes and Waterworks Extensions \$125,000 Needed. BRANTFORD, May 15.—In the near future the taxpayers of Galt will be asked to contribute a considerable sum for school purposes and waterworks extensions. The trustees of the Collegiate Institute have decided to ask for \$75,000 for the erection of a new gymnasium, and the government inspector threatened to degrade the institution to the rank of a high school if this was done. The Public school board will request the council to pass a law providing \$50,000 for a new public school, tenders for which are now in hand and a site purchased. Some \$100,000 more will be required by the Water Commission to carry out its proposal for a new trunk main and to make extensions to supply residents in new sections of the town.

BLOCKERS BRIGADE WILL DISCONTINUE THEIR BLOCKING

Naval Bill Will Receive Third Reading at Ottawa Tomorrow - Serious Doubt as to Whether Senate Will Throw it Out or Not.

OTTAWA, May 15.—The Naval Aid Bill is to pass the House to-morrow if the present understanding is carried out. Furthermore, and again if the understanding is carried out, the closure rule, will not be invoked for the third reading. The necessary motion was not given yesterday. It is pretty certain to be given if there is any hitch to-morrow. The willingness signified by the Opposition to vote on the third reading 34-day without insisting upon the closure means a complete reversal of the original intention, though not, perhaps, a change of heart. The leading obstructionists are in leash for the time being, the moderate element of the Opposition having at last asserted control. This was not accomplished without difficulty. It was not until yesterday afternoon, after the bill would have already passed the House this week. What seems to have happened is this: The riotous behaviour of Saturday morning, when the bill was reported out of committee, has had a bad effect upon the party. Sane Liberals realize this and don't want to have the scene repeated. At the same time they have persuaded themselves that by voting without the closure they are losing nothing, because they believe the Senate can be relied upon to kill the bill whether passed by the Commons under closure or not. To-day there will be some speeches, some amendments will be moved—perhaps for the six months' hoist—and the final division will be taken. The Liberals will affirm their unalterable hostility to the government's proposal for increasing the effective naval forces of the empire. The naval aid proposal has been before Parliament since December 5, when the resolution was introduced by the Prime Minister in his memorable speech. The bill was read a second time on February 27, and went into committee. There it stayed till last Saturday morning, the closure being introduced and adopted in the meantime, following the two weeks' sitting which began March 10. The Senate will probably take up the bill next week. The Commons Liberals, as already stated, still believe that their friends in the Upper House can be relied upon to kill the measure, even though sent up without the closure. This confidence is not so generally shared in the lobbies as it was a week or two ago. The Senate is showing some signs of a disposition to pass the bill after all. The Liberal majority includes many Senators who would like to do the bidding of the blockers, but there are others who have never liked the idea from the beginning and like it less every day. As a result there is a chance that, as between the passage of the bill and some sort of Senate reform, the Senate may choose the former.

Omaha Has Bad Storm

OMAHA, Neb., May 15.—Reports received early to-day show that the tornado which formed in the southern part of Steward county last night took a toll of 17 lives, injured forty persons and destroyed property valued at \$250,000. At least three towns—Seward, Tomar and McCool Junction—suffered from the tornado, the greatest destruction being at Seward where eleven persons were killed and thirty injured. At Tomar, four lives were lost and much property destroyed. At McCool Junction two deaths occurred. At Seward a much greater disaster was averted by the fact that the tornado crossed only a comparatively small part of the town, instead of sweeping across the more densely populated section two blocks south. The property loss in that city is estimated at \$100,000. The tornado apparently originated southwest of McCool Junction, and gathering force as it moved to the northeast, struck with full force both at Tomar and Seward. The storm crossed this city near the southern limits but its strength had been so far spent that the damage done here was nominal. This fact, however, did not prevent many Omahans from seeking refuge in cellars and other places considered tornado-proof. The experience of Easter Sunday taught them to consider seriously the approach of ominous-looking clouds and the appearance of the southwest of last evening's storm was sufficient to set everybody to looking for avenues of escape.
