Without any of the kilts, Lochiel of Cameron and Lady Hermoine Cameron Lochiel arrived in New York. Despite the ordinary garb he wore, Lochiel is probably the most thorough Scotchman who has arrived in the United States in many a day, for he is the twenty-fifth of his family to be at the head of the Cameron clan, and never once through the twenty-four generations has allegiance to the Stuarts wavered.

Though only thirty-seven, the present Lochiel of Cameron has an enviable war record, having served in two campaigns of the Boer War. At present he is the lieutenant colonel of the Third battalion of Cameron Highlanders. Because of their long standing attachment to the Stuart cause the Lochiels of Cameron have never been made peers of England, according to the present Lochiel.


