

No. 6,553, Girl's Apron. This simple one piece apron can be worn over any dress, or it may be made of warm material and worn with a waist only, instead of a dress. The closing i in the back and the skirt section is in one with the bib, which covers the front and extends as a wide collar at the shoulders and again covering the back. Gingham, calico, chambray and woollen goods are suitable.

The apron pattern, No. 6.553, is cut in sizes 6, 8, 10, 12 and 14 years. Medium size requires 1% yards of 27 inch ma eir members and the new move i terial. .


